At Monday morning's session of the annual convention of the Church of Christ, on Prince Edward Island, held at Montague, the devotional services were led by Rev. Geo. F. Kemp. This was followed by an address from Rev. A. B. Wade of Montague, on "Missionary work on the Island." There was an interesting and profitable discussion on this subject. Among those participating were Rev. E. A. McIvor of Montague and Rev. H. S. Erb of Hazelbrook. These gentlemen, both members of the Baptist Association, emphasized the importance of union between that body and the Church of Christ. They have both the same problems to solve and union would assist in their solution.

Rev. Mr. Floyd suggested that a committee be appointed next year to confer on the question with a view to have the union effected. At the afternoon session devotional exercises were led by R. T. Warren, student of Drake University. The following officers were elected: President (re-elected), Rev. J. F. Floyd; Secretary, Treasurer, J. Harry Williams. Reports from the different churches showed a substantial increase in the membership and that general conditions were satisfactory. There are 10 churches with a membership of 500. Almost all the churches were represented at the convention. No special plans for any new work were formed. The officers were constituted a board of missions to arrange for engaging evangelists, if deemed desirable, between this convention and the next.

At the evening session Rev. Mr. Floyd led the O. Norton of Drake University, delivered an able and eloquent address on "Service," dealing with the parable of the Good Samaritan by way of illustration. A farewell service was then held in the convention hall adjourned. The next place of meeting will probably be Charlottetown.

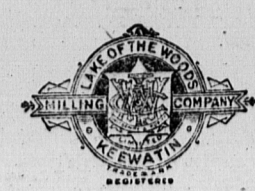
