### Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The sole head of a family or any male over sixteen years of age may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Utilities—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land, in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Utilities—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Just reside six months in each of three years cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$500. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction cause of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

## Did Gerard Say These Things?

BERLIN, Jan. 7, via Sayville.—A large number of the leading personalities of Germany, says the Overseas News Agency, were present at the dinner given last night in honor of James Gerard, the United States ambassador to Germany, by the American Association of Commerce and Trade of Berlin. The dinner was addressed by Ambassador Gerard, Vice-Chancellor Helfferich, Foreign Secretary Zimmermann and Arthur Von Gwynner, the director of the Deutsche Bank, and in all the speeches the cordial relations existing between the governments of the United States and Germany were emphasized.

Ambassador Gerard, who was likened by Dr. Von Gwynner to the "peace dove of Noah's ark," responded by saying: "Never since the beginning of the war have the relations between Germany and the United States been as cordial as now. I have brought back an olive branch from the president, or don't you consider the president's message an olive branch?"

"I personally am convinced that as long as Germany's fate is directed by such men as my friend, the chancellor, and Dr. Helfferich and Dr. Solts, by Admiral Von Capelle (minister of navy), Holtzendorff (head of the naval general staff), and Von Mueller (naval adviser to the emperor); by Generals Von Hindenburg (chief of the general staff), and Ludendorff (first quartermaster-general), and last, but not least, by my friend Zimmermann, the relations between the two countries are running no risk."

## MISTAKEN FOR ELOPER BUT SAYS HE IS NOT DONN BYRNE FROM P.E.I.

The New York Sun Says:—"Donn Byrne, a writer of short stories, who lives at 15 Clark street, Brooklyn, went to the Pinkerton office in Manhattan yesterday to explain that he isn't the "Donn Byrne" who eloped from Prince Edward Island last summer with a young woman and \$200,000 in stocks and bonds, and "wouldn't they please call off their sleuths?"

"Mr. Byrne, though he had received a letter early in December from the Bank of Ottawa, at Vancouver, British Columbia, requesting him to forward the address of his 'mother-in-law,' Mrs. Christina Budd, of Prince Edward Island—who isn't his mother-in-law at all—didn't suspect he was being 'looked up' until Karl Harriman of the Ladies' Home Journal, drew him aside in the Players' Club in Manhattan and asked him if it were serious.

"The visit to the Pinkerton agency followed. There the story unfolded of how a man impersonating the author had eloped with Mrs. Budd's daughter or servant (the identity is not quite clear) and had cashed some of her securities in Vancouver while ostensibly en route to Shanghai, China. Mr. Byrne explained that he is a married man with two children and that he spent his summer usual with his family at Port Jernison, L. I. He expressed hope that the Pinkertons would catch the man who used his name."
