The majority of the complaints were directed against subversive influence of kulaks (allegedly wealthy peasants) on the management of collective farms, corruption of the class point of view in the administration of village Soviets, and misuse of office by various politicians.

Complaints Increase—Red tape seems to be an irremediable and constant factor in the Soviet apparatus. The number of complaints against it were 2,413 in 1929 and 2,950 in 1930, indicating an increase of more than 22 percent.

Similarly with complaints against bureaucracy—from 641 in 1929 to 954 in 1930, an increase of nearly 50 percent.

IN MEMORIAM MR. BERNARD J. MCCORMAC

The death of Mr. Bernard J. McCormac occurred in the General Hospital at St. John's, Newfoundland, on the morning of Sunday, April 19th. Mr. McCormac was a prominent farmer of St. George's, King County, in this Province, who retired from active work two years ago, and since then has been residing with his nephew, Mr. Picton R. McCormac, Manager of Cousins Ltd., of Newfoundland. Last fall, Mr. McCormac's health began to fail and since then up to his death, had been indifferent.

His remains, accompanied by his nephew, reached St. Georges last Thursday and were taken to his home. The funeral was held Friday morning to St. George's Church, Rev. C. J. McDonald officiating at Solemn High Mass, after which surrounded by his former neighbors and a large concourse of people from several parts of King's County, his remains were laid to rest beside those of his father and mother, close by the Calvary Group that adorns the central part of St. George's Cemetery.
