MR. GEORGE STURDY
He passed calmly and peacefully at his home in Tryon on Sunday evening, July 11th, 1926, at the age of 56 years. Having been in delicate health for some months his death was no unexpected. He was born in Crapaud, and when a young man, located in Tryon, and became one of the most enterprising and successful farmers in the community. The deceased was a

man of sterling character, highly respected by all who knew him, and will be greatly missed by his wide circle of friends and acquaintances, but more especially by his own family, as tender ties have been severed and hearts made sore. His was a very hospitable home, friends and strangers being always welcome, many having been helped by his kindly assistance and advice. During his illness he seldom murmured or complained, but sought even in the grip of death to comfort his sorrowing family. Death came as a quiet sleep, such a departure transforms death into the

glorious realities of the Great Beyond. His wife pre-deceased him about forty years ago. He leaves to mourn one brother Thomas of Tryon, four sons and four daughters who were all at his bedside, namely: Thomas and William of Crapaud, Ernest and Roy on the homestead, Mrs. Joseph Francis of Gambles Corner, Mrs. Frank Robblee of Tryon, Lizzie and Grace at home. The funeral service was conducted at the house and grave by Rev. G. N. Somers, who frequently visited him during his illness, and who spoke such comforting words to the bereaved. The remains were followed by a large concourse of people to the Crapaud cemetery where he was tenderly laid to rest. The pall-bearers were three sons, Thomas, Ernest, Roy and Frank Robblee, Earle Francis and Lloyd Sturdy.

Manitoba though classified as a prairie province, has 70 per cent. of its area that may be termed forest land. Forest reserves in the province amount to 3,729 square miles.

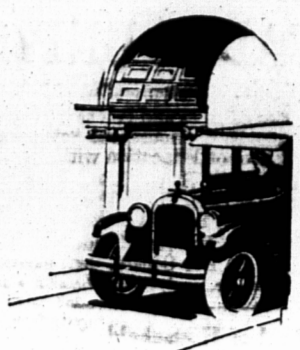
MEDITATIONS ON THE LIFE OF CHRIST.

LONDON LETTER

THE OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN HIGH COMMISSIONER IN LONDON, WEEK BY WEEK. 5th AUGUST, 1926.
The League of Nations Union expects to hold a Conference in London from February 1st to February 4th next on Methods of Fixing Minimum Wages and on questions of Conciliation and Arbitration in Industrial Disputes. The High Commissioner has been asked to forward the name of an expert with knowledge of Canadian conditions who can give a short address on this occasion.
During the week ending 4th August, three shipments of Canadian Store Cattle have arrived at United Kingdom ports, 922 animals being landed in good condition. The High Commissioner's Office is informed by the Canadian Trade Commission in Great Britain that they have received the following enquiries for Canadian goods during the past week:
A West of England firm of seed merchants wishes to communicate with responsible Canadian growers who can offer stocks of carefully grown Seed Peas for market gardeners.
A Birmingham house of manufacturers and wholesalers would be interested in Canadian supplies of Machine Skimmed Milk Powder, from manufacturers who are not already represented in the United Kingdom.
A firm of Birmingham Importers desires to hear from Canadian manufacturers of Ice Cream Freezers of the large hand operated type. Capacity 15, 18 and 24 quarts.
A Glasgow firm desires to get into touch with exporters of Canadian Dried Butter, Dried Skim Milk, and Pure Dried Milk.
A Belfast firm desires to form a connection with New Brunswick or Nova Scotia exporters of Spruce, not already fully represented on this side.
A Manchester firm is interested in securing an agency in the North of England, for a Canadian manufacturer of Men's Piece-Lined Underwear.
A Liverpool merchant firm invites C. L. F. quotations from Canadian manufacturers on second-hand Sacks, for which they are in the market from time to time.
A Liverpool firm would be glad to hear from Canadian manufacturers of Woven Wire Fencing not already represented in this market, with a view to acting as distributors.
London indent firm receives regular enquiries for ferro-manganese and silico-manganese, and would be glad to hear from Canadian producers in a position to offer supplies.
Further details of these can be obtained from the Natural Resources Intelligence Branch of the Department of Trade and Commerce, or from the Canadian Trade Commissioner, The Canadian Building, Trafalgar Square, London, S. W. 1.
