WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28 - Seizing house control from party leaders, an overwhelming bi-partisan force today struck the sales tax from the billion dollar United States revenue bill. It was the most spectacular revolt in years. Flushed with the confidence of four previous major victories, the belligerent sales tax opponents swept the provision out by a teller vote of 282 to 153.

**Insurance Bills Introduced In Federal House**

OTTAWA, Ont., March 28 - (By the Canadian Press) - Two of the three insurance bills which are designed to rub out any conflict of authority existing between Dominion and Provincial Legislation were introduced in the Senate yesterday by Senator Arthur Meighen Government leader.

The Provinces of Ontario and Quebec have not yet acquiesced in the terms of the new bills, Mr. Meighen said. Further conferences were necessary, but that need not delay their consideration by the Senate committee. A Privy Council judgment last year found some of the provisions of the Canada Insurance Act infringed on provincial jurisdiction on which necessitated the new bills. The third bill will be introduced later.

The first bill was a measure respecting the department of insurance and the second, had to do with foreign insurance companies in Canada. Senator Meighen intimated that the third bill would deal with Canadian and British insurance companies.

The government leader recalled the introduction at the opening of the present session of two bills, one referring to Dominion insurance companies and British and foreign companies. Both of these bills had been drawn up in the expectation that they would probably interpret all the decisions of the Privy Council defining the jurisdiction of the Dominion with respect to insurance. The bills were duly referred to the Standing Committee on banking and commerce, but considerable objection began to appear from various quarters.

Two Provinces, Ontario and Quebec, claimed the bills contravened their jurisdiction, particularly in the light of the most recent decision of the Privy Council. The former bills were then withdrawn and new ones drawn up. The two introduced today, intimated Senator Meighen, did not cover all the ground of the first two bills so another would be necessary. The first bill establishing the department of insurance on the bases laid by the recent decisions. The second bill deals only with foreign, or as they might be termed, alien companies. There were many of these alien companies doing business in Canada, the word "companies" including associations and foreign exchanges of the nature of the New England reciprocals and mutuals.

The British companies were not included in the bill relating to foreign companies but would be dealt with in the bill concerning Dominion companies.

B., March 28 - (By the Canadian Press) - Fifteen-year-old Norman O'Donnell, son of Mrs. Eaton O'Donnell of St. Stephen, died early yesterday morning of a wound in the brain, inflicted by a rifle fired by a chum, Donald Acheson, also 15. Acheson said he was shooting at a squirrel on a barn, the bullet went through the wall and hit young O'Donnell, who was in the barn.

An inquest has been called for 9.30 a. m. today.
