Word has been received here of a sad tragedy in which two former Prince Edward Islanders figure, one as the victim, the other the murderer. Fred Cook who left Summerside a number of years ago shot and killed his wife (nee Miss Annand Harvie, daughter of Henry Harvie, Linkletter Road) on the night of Monday, August 27th in Los Angeles California. The couple who after leaving Prince Edward Island lived in Boston, have been estranged for some time, and a few months ago Mrs. Cook removed to Los Angeles California, where she obtained a position as house keeper at the Dentention Home. It is said that she lived in constant fear of her husband, who was subject to religious mania and had threatened to kill her. On the night of which his wife had taken passage from Santa Monica to Los Angeles. After occupying the seat next her for a few minutes he deliberately drew his revolver and shot her dead. In the confusion which followed he leaped through the window, although the car was going at full speed. The county and city police immediately set out in pursuit, but so far his capture has not been reported. Much sympathy is felt here for the relatives of both the unfortunates. Deceased leaves two small children.
