Chinatown Sad "We Grow Old"

WINNIPEG, Aug. 12 (CP)—Behind the gay, flashing lights of the busy city houses of Winnipeg's Chinatown, there is sadness. Bland Orientals conceal their feelings beneath smiles and bows of welcome, but in their hearts they are blue.

Winnipeg's Chinese community is rapidly shrinking in population and becoming a colony of old men—as is the case in like communities throughout the Dominion.

"Take a look around you," a Chinese said recently. "Look along King Street and then down Pacific Avenue." These are the main streets of Winnipeg's Chinatown. Most of the inhabitants were either sitting on their doorsteps on chairs brought down from apartments above restaurants and stores or loitering beneath street lamps smoking their pipes and talking in their native tongue. They were nearly all wizened and old—men of 50 or 60 is considered comparatively young in Winnipeg's Chinese community.

Relative Barred

The Chinese say that in time there will be no Chinese in Winnipeg. There is a steady drain—about 50 persons either die or return to China each year.

Canadian immigration laws ban Chinese from entering Canada. Efforts are being made to have these regulations eased but no success has been realized to date.

At one time Winnipeg's Chinatown had a population of approximately 1,400. Today there are less than 700 and each year it grows smaller. There are less than 25 Chinese women in the city.

Most Chinese here are in the restaurant business. Others operate hand laundries, one or two are salesmen and some operate taxicabs. Still others are professional gamblers.

A majority like the city and want their relatives and friends to join them. They have successful businesses and have prospered.

Winnipeg Chinese—and Chinese in other centres, are sad. They are sad, they say, because most of their kin cannot join them.

In Memoriam

MRS. HEATH VESEY

Few deaths have caused such sincere sorrow as that which occurred in the community of York, in the passing of Mrs. Heath Vesey at the P. E. I. Hospital on Friday, July 11th, after a prolonged illness of over three years which she bore with patience and Christian fortitude.

She was lovingly cared for by her devoted family during this period and all possible medical aid and care procured for her comfort by her son Arthur, with whom she resided.

She will always be missed in the community where she took such a keen interest and active part in all church and community welfare.

At an early age she became a member of the York Methodist Church, later the United Church. She organized and was the beloved leader of the Mission Circle, which she always welcomed to her home where she was known as "Aunt Orlo" to all the boys and girls.

She loved to entertain young people and they will always remember the good times enjoyed at sing songs and other gatherings, and the Christian influence she exercised over all.

Born at York 65 years ago, she was the daughter of the late Amos West and Mary Drake and in 1904 was married to Heath E. Vesey, who predeceased her 14 years ago.

She leaves to mourn one daughter, Mary, Mrs. Harold Metcalfe of Dartmouth, N.S., and one son, Arthur, on the homestead. She is also survived by two sisters, one brother and three grandsons.

She was laid to rest in the York cemetery; a short service in her home was followed by a service in the York United Church by her pastor, Rev. J. A. Nicholson, who frequently visited her during her long illness. Assisting at the funeral service was Rev. F. H. Whitcomb, a former pastor, and Rev. Thos. Wilson of West Covehead.

The pallbearers were: Messrs. Ollie Brown, Minto Foster, Frank Vesey, Leigh Vesey, Finlay Drake and Wallace Mallett. The very large number attending the funeral and the beautiful flowers, numerous letters of sympathy all show the love and regard in which the deceased was held.

EGG AND POULTRY MARKET REPORT

Egg receipts decreasing, however pulled eggs are now appearing in small quantities. Quality remains at present levels with the quantity of Grade A eggs insufficient to meet the demand. Declining receipts with no improvement in quality has strengthened the market with the result prices have increased. Grading stations are now paying for ungraded eggs delivered: A Large 37-8; A Medium 35-6; A Pullet 28; B 27-8; C 21-2.

Graded shipments f.o.b. shipping point: A Large 44 1-2; A Medium 42 1-2; B 31 1-2; C 23.

A-1 producers receiving for cartoned pack: A Large 46; A Medium 44; A Pullet 35.

Poultry receipts about the same as last week. Receipts except for fowl are being disposed of at present levels. Demand for fowl has slackened somewhat with the result paying prices have weakened. Dealers quoting for poultry delivered Charlottetown basis net grading:

Chickens: (Over 4 lbs.): MFA 33; MFB 31; B 28; C 18. (Under 4 lbs.): MFA 31; MFB 29; B 21; C 14.

Fowl: (Over 4 lbs.): A 22-4; B 20-2; C 10-12. (Under 4 lbs.): A 20-2; B 18 20; C 8.
