COUNCIL MEETING - A special meeting of the National Housing Council was held at the home of Mr. James Hall, of the Federal Department, Ottawa, at a special meeting of the council last night. Methods of procedure in setting up a municipal planning board were discussed.

ORPHANAGE CHILDREN SAVED - The children from St. Mary's Orphanage were saved from the Mobile Army Medical Center and transported to and from the centre being provided through the efforts of Mr. Frank Aoyagi and the Island Motor Transport. The children all enjoyed the trip.

DEATHS - MacRae - At the General Hospital, Hamilton, Ont., on Feb. 24, 1946, Robert James MacRae, formerly of Mt. Buchanan, P. E. Island.

The report states that in July, 1945, the Government was approached by the War Assets Corporation with a view to acquiring certain materials sent to this Province early in 1945 by the Dominion Department of Penalties and National Health for the purpose of exercising air raid precautions.

Each of the towns and villages concerned had its own committee controlled by the central committee with headquarters in Charlottetown. The providing of this material, including the fire fighting equipment, fulfilled the requirements in rural areas.

The Department of Reconstruction was charged with the responsibility of disposing of the surplus material to the best advantage of the communities of Prince Edward Island. Cooperation was had with the Civilian Defense Corps with a view to issuing a standard order and the acquisition of the material by the Department.

The medical and fire fighting equipment was found to be intact. An examination of the surplus equipment showed this material to be of value for all purposes as deterioration had not set in over a period of four years.

The policy of the Department in the disposal of C.D.C. or A.R.P. equipment is thus cited briefly: First priority was given to the communities already supplied with equipment to retain same. Second priority was allotted to other communities which did not previously have such equipment and desired to obtain it.

War Assets Activities of the Department in obtaining surplus material from the United States Government are also reviewed in the report. As was the case with educational material, a large amount of surplus material for re-establishing the Department has been available to render a more satisfactory service to the community. It will be in a still better position in the near future.

Two auction sales of surplus war equipment were held in the Province, the first at the Mount Pleasant airport and the second at the Charlottetown airport. Large crowds attended both sales and much material which had hitherto been in short supply.

The Department exercised its priority at both sales and purchased a large quantity of goods prior to auction day. A considerable quantity of fixtures for the new wing of the Provincial Sanatorium was acquired. The various hospitals in the Province also received considerable material.

NOW THE LID IS OFF LOAD 10 LBS. LOAD 85000 LBS. In the centre of a quarter-inch-thick steel case twenty inches square cushioned with dry sawdust between layers of sponge rubber. The lid of the steel box was secured by ten bolts and had two grab-on handles for carrying. The total shipment of 70 pounds was enough for 200,000 25-pound shells. The photographs show the engine and two express cars of one of the trains crossing a bridge. The first car carries ten pounds of dry lead aside and the second a capacity load of 85,000 pounds of ordinary merchandise. The drawing indicates how the twenty cases, each containing eight ounces of the explosive, were placed and bolted to the floor of the car. This was the first and only shipment of dry lead aside by rail known. It is normally manufactured at the munitions plants where the shells are made. In this instance, had not the Canadian National Express handled the shipment, the production of shells would have been delayed for months.

R.C.A.F. Recruiting Unit To Visit Here - HALIFAX, March 1 - Mobile recruiting units, similar to those used during the war will be sent by the R.C.A.F. on tours of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island next week. It was announced by Eastern Air Command Headquarters of the R.C.A.F. today. The mobile units will visit the smaller centres in the two provinces with the object of interviewing prospective recruits for ground crew in the permanent R.C.A.F.
