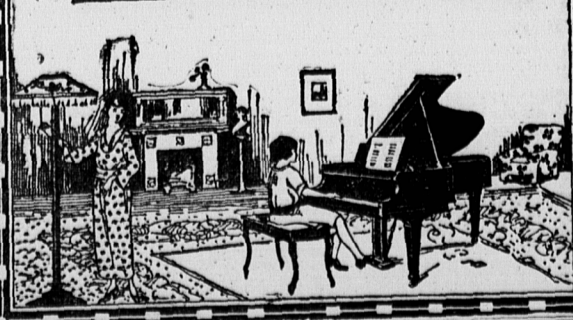

U. S. IDLE FREIGHT CARS. NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Despite the fact that the car loading for the week ended July 28 of 1,041,044 were the highest in the history of the railroads, there was available a surplus of 76,453 freight cars, according to figures that were made public by the American Railway Association. The total number of freight cars available on July 28 was 3,257 less than on July 22. Of the total number available on July 28, 67,881 were box cars, a decrease of 3,388 in approximately a week; while there was a surplus of 6,516 coal cars in good repair, an increase of 1,379 in a week. Surplus stock cars numbered 3,457, a decrease of 846 since July 22, while a decrease of 648 was reported in refrigerator cars. The majority of the box cars now shown in the surplus column the report explains, are cars being held in the grain-originating territory and will be absorbed within the next few weeks as the grain movement becomes heavier.
