To quicken the interest of each member in the public welfare of his community, and to co-operate with others in its civic, social, commercial, and industrial development. Every one present expressed their conviction that such an organization would fill a much felt want in Charlottetown and agreed to give it their hearty and enthusiastic support.

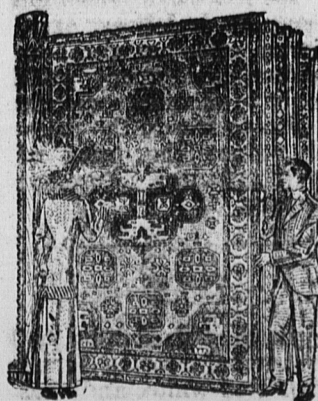
