### Wheat Export Clearances

By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—Export clearances of wheat for the week ending Feb. 2 amounted to 3,081,462 bushels, an increase of more than 500,000 bushels as compared with the previous week when 2,490,468 bushels were exported, says a report issued today by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. A decrease of more than 800,000 bushels was shown however, in comparison with the corresponding week of last year when the exports were 3,982,807 bushels.

### CAPT. OF KROMHOUT WILL STAND TRIAL

#### Committed On Two Counts — Theft And Obstructing A Police Officer. Crew Discharged.

By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Feb. 6.—Captain Ross Mason, whose 14-year-old motor-ship Kromhout escaped on Friday two months ago with a pilot crew of coast guards aboard, must face trial in Supreme Court on two charges today in a theft charge and on a second accusation of obstructing a police officer, the latter laid against the 14-year-old motor-ship as it came into court this morning. As the same time, the seamen who made up Mason's crew when his ship broke away from the patrol boat, Stumble Inn off Cape Breton, were discharged. They had been under charge of aiding the theft of their seized vessel.

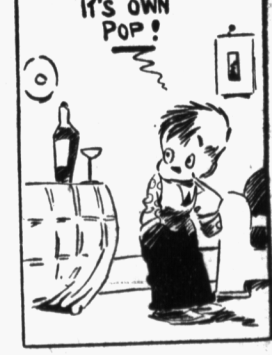
### Island Lady Dies, Aged 102

### May Ship Beer To Licensed Persons

By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—When the bill amending the Importation of Intoxicating Liquors act receives third reading brewers and distillers in one province will be able to ship their wares to persons who, in other provinces, have been licensed either by the provincial governments or the liquor commissions. Today the bill secured second reading in the House of Commons and passed through committee of the whole.

### Four Held On Theft Charge
