## THE PRELIMINARY OBJECTION HELD

### To be Good--Petitions Filed Against Messrs Martin and McLean Thus Fall to the Ground--The Members Elect for Queen's Will Hold their Seats.

Yesterday forenoon judgment was given by Mr. Justice Hodgson on the preliminary objections to the election petition against Angus A. McLean and Alexander Martin, members elect for Queens County. The Master of the Rolls sustained the objections with costs and the petition thus fell to the ground.

The election of a member for the House of Commons of Canada for the electoral District of Queens in the Province of Prince Edward Island is held on the 27th day of October, 1904 and the 3rd day of November, 1904.

Stephen R. Burke, Petitioner and Angus A. McLean, Respondent. The petitioner filed his Petition in this matter on the 10th December 1904. Preliminary objections were filed on the 31st day of the same month. These objections are 19 in number but I shall deal only with the 3rd and 4th, and the 10th, and 17th.

Nos 3 and 4 are as follows. 3--Because the petitioner had no right to vote at the election but was disqualified from voting thereat and is still disqualified from voting in the said electoral District of Queens.

4--the said petitioner was disqualified and incompetent to vote and had no right to vote at the said election for the said electoral district of Queens because he was disqualified under the provisions of Sect. 8 of the Act 63 and 66 Victoria Cap 12 intituled the Dominion Elections Act 1900.

At the hearing it was found that the Petitioner had been hired by the Secretary of the Liberal Convention as a clerk in their election committee rooms. He was employed for 22 days up to the time of the election and was paid \$48. On the election day he voted for Mr. Warburton at the Poll in Charlottetown of ward 5 west centre but was not paid for that day's work.

17--That no writ for the election of a member for the House of Commons of Canada for the electoral district of Queens in the Province of Prince Edward Island was issued as in the said petition declared and no election was holden on the 27th day of October 1904 and the 3rd day of November 1904 for the election of member for the House of Commons of Canada for the said electoral district of Queens as alleged in the said petition and the Returning Officer did not make the return stated in the said Petition.

I am of opinion that this objection is well taken and must prevail. From the evidence of Ewen McDougall the returning officer it appears that a writ was issued for the return of two members for Queens and that two members were elected. There was no writ issued for the election of a member nor was there any return of a member for Queens county.

It is quite possible for such a writ to issue, such an election to be held, and such a return to be made--e.g. by the acceptance of office or a vacancy caused by the death of one of the sitting members of Queens County; but such was not the case at the last election.

No. 2 of the General Rules made by the Supreme Court of this Province for the trial of controverted elections declares that "the petition shall state the result of the election" and in Rule No. 5 giving the form of the petition requires a statement of the return of the Returning Officer and who had been returned by him as duly elected.

The view I have taken of objections 16 and 17 render it unnecessary for me to consider objections 3 and 4. The preliminary objections are sustained with costs.

### THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

Sir--There appeared in The "Patriot" of last evening an editorial reference to an article in The "Examiner" of the 9th inst, suggesting the removal of the Legislative Library to the large room formerly used as the Legislative Council Chamber. It is not my intention nor duty to discuss the above matter; nor would it be proper for me to refer to the question of whether or not the Government is "supposed to provide a place for a public library for the convenience or pleasure of the citizens of Charlottetown" although with regard to both matters there is room for a difference of opinion. But it certainly is my duty to correct several surprisingly untruthful statements concerning the Legislative Library which the writer of The "Patriot's" article wilfully ignoring the facts, and unimpaired as yet with the modern library spirit, has made.

Without quoting the inaccuracies verbatim, I deny them by stating the following facts which are known to all who visit the Library: (1) The Legislative Library is not merely a reference library. From time immemorial its books have been circulated. (2) It is extensively used by the general public. (3) There are no "cardinals of unnecessary books" to burn. (4) The present room is wholly inadequate as regards size, for the purposes of the Library. (5) The "old records" are daily consulted. (6) The rooms of the attic of the Provincial Building are now full of "old records" often referred to, which would be brought down to the main library if room permitted. (7) There is not "ample space in the room at present occupied to arrange and classify all the reference books required for both politicians and editors." (8) The members of the Legislature and editors do not use the Library as much as the general public.

Respectfully invite the writer of The "Patriot" article to visit the Legislative Library, observe for himself the extensive number of its valuable contents by the public, and become acquainted with the field occupied by it, and the possibilities for usefulness of a progressive library.
