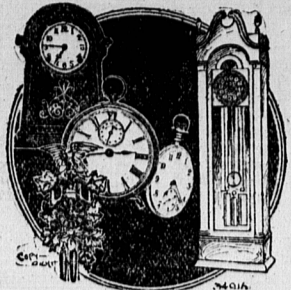

A young man named Frank Gillis, a cleaner on the P. E. I. R., was injured at Cape Traverse yesterday in the engine house. The injury was not a very serious one but he is laid off from work. Frank Dorsey, of the P. E. I. R. shops here, was sent yesterday to take the injured man to the hospital.

A. E. Morrison, city, of the Anglo American Telegraph Co., returned yesterday morning from Cape Traverse where he was looking after the removal of the office at Carleton, one mile from the shore, to the iceboat house. This change is made every winter to facilitate telegraph matters in connection with the iceboat service. The slight interruption was but when being removed.

Today, February 18th., is the eleventh anniversary of the death of Roland D. Taylor, son of E. W. Taylor, City, who was killed in the battle of Modder River, Transvaal, on Sunday, Feb. 18, 1900. On that same day, it will be remembered, there were nineteen Canadians killed, fifty-eight wounded, seven captured and one missing. Among the wounded were Walter Lane, Rocky Pt. and Fred Wye, Hunter River.

It is reported that eight dogs have been poisoned recently in this city. Of these the majority are said to be valuable pure bred animals, besides being well trained and inoffensive. One or two of those done away with in this contemptible manner were alleged to have vicious habits, but even this is no excuse for the perpetrators to get in their work. Should a dog annoy any citizen, there is a proper course to take, provided for by law, which will insure the restraint or destruction of the animal. Still parties will take the law in their own hands, but by so doing, may find to their sorrow, that they have committed a punishable offence. Many warnings have been publicly given in this respect in late years but the miserable practice of setting out poison still exists.

Rev G. M. Campbell, St. John, formerly of this city, is taking a keen and active part in all religious movements in that city. He was present at a recent meeting of the Evangelical Alliance and laymen at which the following clergymen, all well known here: Rev. Dr. Flanagan, Dr. Raymond, Dr. Hutchinson, Revs. Reid, Gaetz. A number of addresses given at this meeting but previous to this Rev. Dr. Hutchinson brought before the meeting a matter which he said, had been discussed by the Baptist ministers and he would like to see some action taken regarding it. For some time he said, a St. John paper had been publishing at intervals the sermons of Pastor Russell on the Dawn of the Millennium, and he firmly believed that it would result in an undermining of the faith of his people. He had gone to the manager of that paper and asked him about the matter and the reply was that a contract had been made to print these sermons of Pastor Russell for one year. But, Mr. Hutchinson said there was nothing to show the readers of the paper that the sermons were paid for, and this was what the Baptist ministers were aiming at. The Millennium Dawn Society had an agent in this city, the speaker said. It is claimed he represents the Bible Society and a few weeks ago was in a house where the good wife told me she had given to her husband for a Christmas present a set of books which an agent said were those of the Bible Society—but they dealt with the millennium dawn. A committee composed of Revs. Messrs Reid, Raymond, Hutchinson, Reid and Gaetz was appointed to interview the manager of the paper upon the matter. It will be remembered that The Guardian at one time published the sermons referred to but the service was discontinued for obvious reasons.

At the debate in P. W. C. on the respective merits of monarchical and republican government, the vote at the close gave a strong majority in favor of monarchy.

Rev Canon Simpson and Mrs Simpson entertained the choir boys and the members of the Bible Class Friday evening at the rectory. A very pleasant time was spent.

Mrs Harry Hodgson, Minneapolis, Minn., who has been visiting in this city and province for the past few weeks, left on the special train to Georgetown on return yesterday.

The bomb signal station at St. Peter's Island has been set up and fitted so that it is now ready for use on the first occasion offering. Recently it was given a good test and was found to be working satisfactorily.

The probate case in connection with the will of the late Augustine McInnis, Earncliffe, was again up before the Judge of Probate yesterday and occupied the attention of the Court all day. The case was adjourned to come up again this morning.

The Guardian acknowledges with thanks the receipt of an artistic calendar for the season and a prospectus of the look Railroad. This calendar is of a design unlike most others and for this reason has a certain charm of originality which embraces its value.

Louis Wright, City, left on the afternoon train for Georgetown where he will leave this morning on the Earl Grey for Picton en route to Vancouver. He will join his father and locate in that city. Louis many friends will earnestly wish him success.

A new light has been placed on St. Peter's Island, replacing the old one. The new light is a white revolving one, visible for a distance of fifteen miles. It is the strongest light on the Prince Edward Island coast and is a distinct improvement in the aids to navigation. The old one was a fixed light, visible twelve miles.

Rev J. F. Floyd will begin in the Central Christian Church tomorrow evening a second series of sermons on his tour through Palestine, covering ground not gone over in the former series. All who attend the services will receive a printed card with all the subjects. The subject tomorrow evening will be "The Fifth Gospel of Palestine."
