OPINION ON THE AMHERST GAME

(St. John Sun, Feb. 20)
The match between the Amherst Ramblers and Charlottetown Abegweits for the Starr trophy tonight promised for the first ten minutes to be a sharp contest, the game being very fast for that period, but after that it became plainly seen that the visitors were outclassed owing principally to their lack of combination work, in which the Ramblers were up to their usual excellency. The latter won, twelve to four. For the visitors Moran played well in goal and Doyle at cover point, and Musick at point did some good blocking and lifting free from body checking. The forwards played an ordinary game. Murray and Twaddle for the Ramblers kept the visitors guessing, while F. Curran made good rushes, scoring two goals in as many minutes. Simpson and E. Curran had their men well in hand. Brown and Currie made a number of good stops at goals.
At the face-off the puck went into Ramblers' ice, the Abegweits shooting several times unsuccessfully. Play was then back and forth when at ten minutes Gormley scored. Two minutes later Simpson got a goal, followed in five minutes by Murray, and soon after by F. Curran, who scored twice within three minutes. Murray then got three goals within five minutes, and Twaddle two in quick succession, closing the first half with a score of 9 for Ramblers and 1 for the Abegweits. In the face-off for the second half play went into the visitors' territory and a lot of lifting occurred. Gormley finally scoring at twelve minutes from play, following in three minutes by Cushing. Ho man got a goal in two minutes later. The Ramblers now thought it time to take a hand again, and Murray, Twaddle and Simpson scored successfully, the game closing 12 to 4 for the Amherst boys. The game was clean throughout, F. Curran being the only player warned.
Eight hundred spectators were present.

PRESIDENT SCHURMAN AND THE BIBLE.

To The Editor of The St. John Telegraph:
Sir,—In your issue of Feb. 8 we have President Schurman's animadversions on the "good book." If Schurman is correctly reported I think Cornell University is not to be congratulated on its choice of a president. I permit me to briefly summarize President Schurman's teaching. He assumes that "Christian Science," so called, and "faith cure," by which one man can exert great powers over the minds and bodies of others have come to stay. "That the Christ of twentieth century must be admitted to be different from the Christ of the preceding nineteen centuries!" He tells us that "the facts of the Bible are not history;" "that there is no history in the Bible because the Hebrews—never wrote history!" He further tells that the students of the seats of learning began by doubting the facts set down in the Bible and from thence proceeded to doubt religion itself! A very natural proceeding, although President Schurman doesn't appear to look upon it in that way. And now, a few words by way of criticism. What, I ask, is meant by the word "history?" History is a written narrative of past events. The historian may also commit to writing events of which he has personal knowledge. The first five books of the Old Testament were written by Moses, and contain the history of the world from the creation until the entrance of the Israelites into the land of Canaan under the leadership of Joshua. Deuteronomy 31: 24, 25, 26. Our Lord tells the Jews to search the scriptures of the Old Testament. He also tells them that Moses wrote of Him. Mark 10: 3, 4, 5, 6; chapter 12: 25, 26; also John 5th, 39: 45, 46, 47. President Schurman used the words "the fundamental principles of religion" and the "whole principles of religion," and told his hearers that materialism had seized hold of students and made doubters of them. And then he compares the miracles performed by our Saviour to those alleged to be performed by Christian Scientists and faith healers! There are quite a number of religious systems in the world—Jewish, Buddhist, Mohammedan, Hinduism and Christianity. Now let me ask, What would be thought of a few who would denounce the Old Testament? He would no doubt be considered a renegade. Or what would be thought—by his fellows—of a Mohammedan who would denounce the Koran? And what are we to think of a learned scientist, a president of a university, who renounces and denounces the Old and New Testaments as a fable and, further, President Schurman is not very felicitous in his use of the English language. He uses the word "facts" several times when he evidently means "fallacies." If a common person should use language in this way he would be justly charged with murdering the king's English. President Schurman uses the words "the fundamental principles of religion," and "the whole principles of religion" but he doesn't explain what he means by his language. As a large part of both the Old and New Testaments is historical he wishes apparently to get rid of that, but it is a dangerous thing to cut and carve, to add to or take away from the word of God; see Revelations 22: 18, 19. Almost every Jew in the time of our Lord believed that Moses was the author of the Pentateuch. Such was the belief of the holy apostles and evangelists and of our Lord Himself, and they who wrote First and Second Chronicles and the Book of Esther, which are largely historical! According to President Schurman they must have been written by Gentiles as "the Hebrews never wrote history." President Schurman might very well take his place alongside the late Ignatius Donnelly, who held that there never was such a person as Shakespeare, or if there was "that he did not write the books generally attributed to him." Has President Schurman never heard of Josephus who wrote a history of certain occurrences about the time of the destruction of Jerusalem? He was a "Hebrew," was he not?
