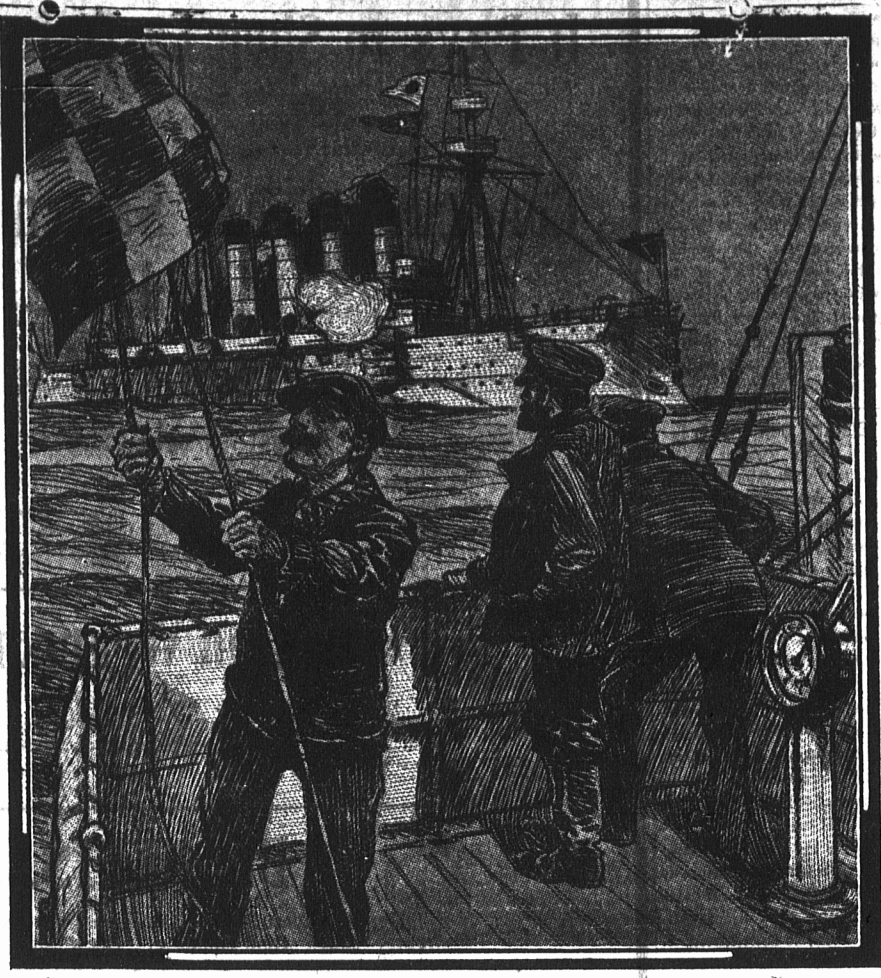

HOW MERCHANT MEN ARE "HELD UP" BY WARSHIPS.

It has been a great many years since a war between two nations has involved to any marked degree the right of search for contraband of war, and the holding up of neutral merchant vessels. The signal displayed by the warship is universal, being used by all nations, and is clearly shown in the above illustration. It is usually understood, and in every case which has occurred recently, that vessels have been fired by the Russian converted cruisers before the merchant vessel has been willing to stop. The general position taken by the Russians in the matter has not only been fully legal and much of the outcry in England has little justification in either the law or the circumstances.

Effect of Antimony.
That terrible poison, antimony, known most familiarly in the compound called tartar-emetac, has a very interesting history. It was introduced into medicine some centuries ago by Paracelsus. Its name signifies that it is "against monks," as some on whom it was tried displayed the now familiar symptoms. Its use in modern medicine has been reduced to vanishing point, with other depressing measures such as bleeding. In the table which arranges the elements in series and shows their connections—so that all are probably modifications of one universal substance—there is a sequence, nitrogen, phosphorus, arsenic, antimony, bismuth; and Sir Lauder Brunton has shown that these possess many common properties in their action upon man, and that these properties vary in relation to the place of each in the scale. In the days before chloroform antimony and tobacco were used to produce the partial unconsciousness which attends their nauseant and depressant properties.

Defences of Mexico.
Mexico is thinking about a new navy, is taking some of the preliminary steps and is also laying out quite extended plans of fortification to be carried on through a period of years as her finances will afford it. Her engineers are preparing plans for a modern fortress on San Juan de Ulloa Island, just outside of Vera Cruz harbor, a site now occupied by the old military prison, and it is expected that the work will be begun this year. Defences for other parts on gulf and Pacific coasts are also in contemplation and will be begun later, not because of any urgent present need of them, but to be ready and fitted up with all modern improvements in case they should at any time be wanted.

The English Starling.
Well informed ornithologists say that an extensive increase in the number of English starlings brought to this country would not only afford delight to eyes and ears, but would be highly beneficial in lessening the ravages of many destructive insects which become a prey to these birds. By all means, then, hurry over the starlings. A lamentable error was committed when those quarrelsome English sparrows were imported. These little fellows have been productive of much more harm than good in this country. The starling would probably be a much more useful introduction.

Green Diamonds.
Considerable interest, writes a correspondent, has been aroused in Johannesburg by the discovery of a mining property at Klerksdorp of a green diamond of about three-quarters carat. The gem had slipped into a crevice in the iron plates of the crushing mill and was found during the dismantling of the mill to make room for a new stamp battery.

In 1893 over seventy similarly colored diamonds were found upon the same property. They had all slipped between the dies and escaped destruction. It is conjectured that many other green stones got crushed out of existence. For the first time since that date the Klerksdorp G. and D. Company proposes to resume operations on this particular ground, which contains both gold and diamonds, and the prospects of unearthing more of these green gems are being eagerly watched from the Rand.

Sources of Rain.
The chief causes of rain are stated by F. A. Rollo Russell to be only four, and in a paper to the Royal Meteorological Society he describes the following: (1) The forced ascent of moist air by the slopes of mountains. (2) A mass of air invading rather suddenly another mass moving from an opposite direction and maintaining its flow below the opposing mass, which it displaces. (3) The ascent of more or less moist air through heavier and colder air to a height where condensation of vapor takes place, increased radiation of heat toward space, and often electrical developments producing further condensation, increase of temperature and renewed ascent with the same result. (4) The mixture of currents of air from different directions.

Sir George Turner.
When Sir George Turner, the Treasurer of the Australian Commonwealth, attended the conference of colonial Premiers in London in 1897, he took a great interest in the thieves' haunts in the capital of the Empire. Under the guidance of detectives he visited them, and had a pretty good insight into the methods of the cockney pickpocket. The knowledge thus gained had application to the ways of Australia, for on Easter Monday Sir George was robbed, while standing on the platform of a St. Klida cable car, of his gold watch and tramcar, of his gold watch and chain, sovereign purse, railway pass and other contents of his waistcoat. It was the very irony of fate that the man who is responsible to the people of Australia for the disposal of nearly £13,000,000 a year should fail to look after £60 worth of personal trinkets on a bank holiday.

Draft Dogs.
In Holland and Belgium the dog occupies the place which the donkey does in several other countries. In the former, the sight of a couple of dogs dragging along a pushcart loaded with vegetables, flowers or shining milk cans is a familiar one. They trot along underneath the cart. The trot of the woman, who walks behind it to guide it by the handles attached at that point. In Belgium the dogs are hitched in front, as the Russians attach their horses to their droskies, three abreast, and are guided by a pair of rope reins fastened to a muzzle about the nose of the dog in the middle.
