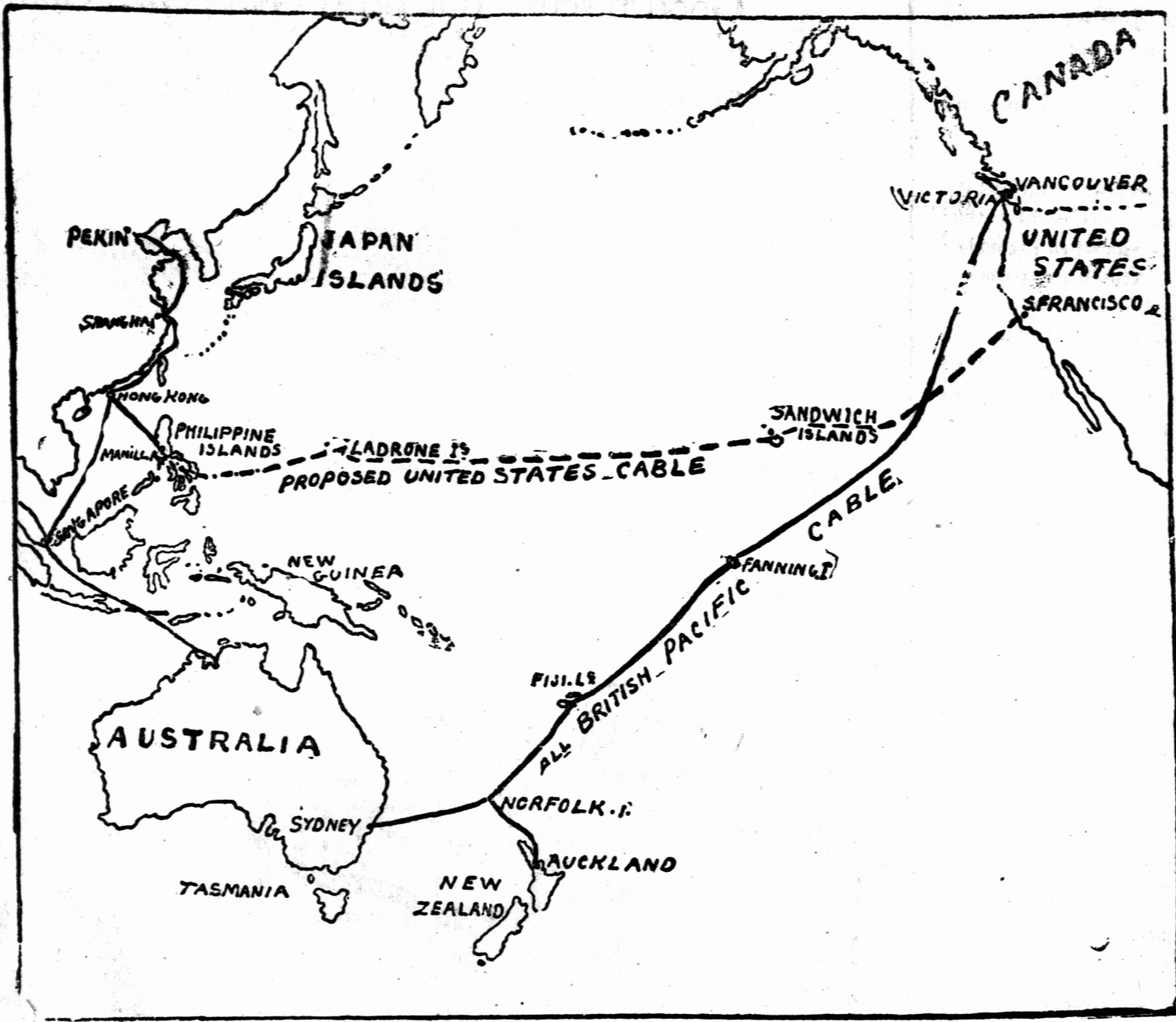
LONDON, Nov. 4.—(Special).—C. Oliver

LATEST SITUATION OF STOCK MARKET.

THE SITUATION.

The market has been most professional in its character the past week. Large banking and financial interests have held aloof from any aggressiveness awaiting a propitious time for their manipulation of stocks for higher prices. They have, however, been acquiring securities on a scale down, and in the coming month a change will be seen when the upward trend of prices will be resumed.

Efforts have been made by the bears to depress the market, but a liquidation is over they fail to bring out any long stock as they are closely held by inside interests and the market has been sold to a standstill. The short interest is exceedingly large and lays the foundation for a substantial advance in the near future. The public are not a factor and are unlikely to be for some time to come. The strength of exchange has caused some uneasiness as gold may go out to Europe. MICHAELMAS TERM.

Tuesday, Nov. 4.—The Michaelmas term of the Supreme Court opened to-day, the three judges presiding. Following are the cases tried:

Grant vs. McInnis, this is an appeal by attorney of plaintiff from an order made from a Judge in chambers for payment of costs by attorney for plaintiff. The Chief Justice delivers judgement dismissing appeal with costs. Justice Hodgson and Justice Fitzgerald concurring.

An application by Henry J. Candall under the Land Purchase Act of 1875 for payment of his commission on certain monies as guardian of the Winsloe estate. Motion Hattenbury vs City Collector —An appeal in the matter of payment of civil taxes—now before the court. W. A. O. Morson, K. C. for applicant. F. L. Hazard, K. C., for respondent.

MITCHELL PRESENTS DEMANDS

Of the Coal Miners for Better
Conditions.

MISS MORTON'S MURDER

Prominent Club and Society Man
Under Arrest—Many Dyings of
Measles.

THE CASE FOR THE MINERS.

HAZELTON, Nov. 4.—(Special)—The case for the miners as presented by President Mitchell demands an increase of twenty per cent in wages paid, a reduction to eight hours a day, the adoption of a system by which coal be weighed and paid for by weight, a minimum rate of sixty cents for a legal ton and a fourth agreement between the men and owners for wages and conditions of work, together with a satisfactory method for adjusting grievances so that strikes and lockouts will be unnecessary.

DID HE MURDER MISS MORTON.

BOSTON, Nov. 4.—(Special)—O. Allen Mason aged 39, son of the head of Mason and Hamlin's piano business, a Harvard graduate and a prominent club and society man was arrested on suspicion of killing Miss Morton at Waverly.

Mason was formerly a patient there, and on last occasion people at home were afraid of him.

DYING FROM MEASLES.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—Thousands of natives of the Herchel Islands along the Artic coast are dying from measles.

GREAT BRITAIN AND TURKEY.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 2.—Things between Great Britain and Turkey with regard to the encroachments of Turkish troops to the Hinterland of Aden have resulted in pacification in the matter. The Porte has modified its note to Great Britain and ordered the evacuation of the Hinterland which was formerly occupied by British troops.
