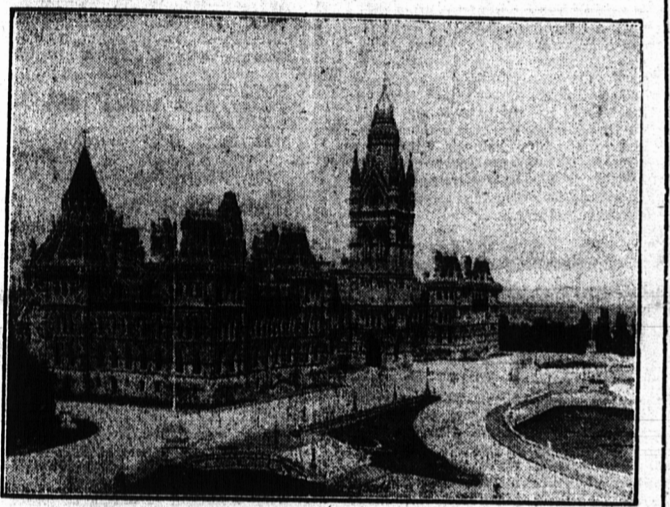

## KING GEORGE IS CONVALESCENT

LONDON, Feb. 6.—King George yesterday made his first public appearance since he suffered injury from an accident while reviewing the British troops in France last October. His Majesty attended a solemn requiem service in honor of the soldiers who have fallen in the war.

## ONE OF ZEPPELINS WHICH RAIDED ENGLAND SUNK IN THE NORTH SEA

LONDON, Feb. 5.—A fishing trawler reported today to the naval authorities that she had seen a German Zeppelin in the North Sea in a sinking condition. It was stated in an official announcement given out this evening.

According to a story current tonight which, however, cannot yet be confirmed, the crew of the Zeppelin were probably all drowned. It seems that the trawler found so many men clinging to the Zeppelin that she made no effort to rescue and left them to their fate.

William Martin of the trawler King Stephen, who has arrived here, reports that early Wednesday morning in the North Sea he saw the Zeppelin L-19, with her boats and a portion of her envelope submerged.

He noticed from seventeen to twenty members of the crew clinging to the envelope. They asked to be taken off, but as the men on the Zeppelin outnumbered the trawler's crew the skipper declined to accede to the request. Instead, he came straight into Grimsby, and reported the matter to the admiralty authorities.

## Marquis Of Bute Soon Off For The Front

LONDON, Feb. 5.—The Daily Sketch this morning announces that Sir John Crichton-Stewart, Marquis of Bute, three times an Earl, twice a Viscount, and six times a Baronet, is now in the "Devil's Own," the pet name of the Insouciant officers training corps.

His determination to go to the front was largely the result of a desire to avenge the death of his brother, Lord Ninian Crichton-Stewart who fell leading the Sixth Welsh Territorials in France.

## Stirring Appeal For Irish Recruits

DUBLIN, via London, Feb. 6.—John Redmond has issued a stirring appeal for recruits from Ireland. He says:

"Recent events have made it absolutely essential that Ireland for her own sake, to guard her own highest interests and to maintain her honor, should make it plain to the whole world that she is willing and eager to fulfil her obligations. Any impression that Ireland is slinking her duty will be a deadly injury to her future interests.

"There has been slackness in recruiting in the agricultural districts, but winning the war is of the greatest importance to Irish agriculturists; for if the Allies are defeated, there is danger of every Irish tenant being robbed of his land by the Prussians. ## THE COMMISSION TO INVESTIGATE OTTAWA FIRE

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—The special commission which is to investigate the burning of the Parliament Buildings will be constituted tomorrow or Tuesday. It will consist of two members, one nominated by the Government and one by the Leader of the Opposition, Mr. R. A. Pringle, K. C., of Ottawa, will in all probability be the Government nominee. The commission will issue as soon as the name of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's nominee is received by the Government and the commissioners will be given authority to employ all expert assistance that may be necessary for the purpose of making the investigation thorough and complete.

## ORDER FOR 800,000 18 POUNDER SHRAPNEL

OTTAWA, Feb. 6.—An order for 800,000 eighteen-pounder shrapnel shells has just been received by the Imperial Munitions Board from the British ministry of munitions. This is the first large order which has come to Canada since the present Munitions Board succeeded the old shell committee.

It is probable that the new order will be allotted in the form of renewals to firms which are already engaged in the manufacture of these shells.

## OTTAWA FACTORY TOTALLY DESTROYED

Had Large Contracts with  
Militia Department for War  
Equipment,  
Supposed to be Work of German  
Plotters.

OTTAWA, Feb. 5.—Following the destruction of the House of Commons at Ottawa a war department factory is in ruins.

Another fire suspected to have been originated by the German plotters, destroyed the clothing manufactory of Gray, Holden and Graham. The firm has extensive contracts with the Militia Department for clothing, tents and haversacks. The building was gutted, entailing a loss of \$225,000. The stock and plant were valued at about \$175,000 and are partly insured.

MONTREAL, Feb. 5.—What is believed to be an attempt to wreck Victoria Bridge was frustrated by guards early this morning. A man seen where he had no right to be was fired on, but escaped.

## Aged Man Commits Suicide

AMHERST, Feb. 4.—An aged man, John Angvine, who inhabits a small house upon the shores of Angvine Lake, Wentworth, committed suicide by shooting himself in the head with a rifle. The details of his death became known but recently. Falling health and dwindling cash caused the tragedy. A number of his relatives had planned to have him taken to some place where he could receive better care and this prospect evidently worried the deceased. Thoughts of suicide entered his head. He tied a string to the trigger of a gun, sat down on the floor and pulled the string with his foot. The bullet entered the head and death was instantaneous.

## AVIATOR DIES.

LONDON, Feb. 5.—Lieut. J. S. Reed, of the Royal Flying Corps died, today as the result of injuries sustained at Aldershot by the fall of a new aeroplane on which he was acting as observer. Lt. Browning, the pilot, was injured badly.

## AFRICAN CAMPAIGN NEARS CONCLUSION

900 German and 14,000 German  
Colonials from Kamerun have  
been Interned and Disarmed in  
Spanish Guiana.

MADRID, Feb. 6.—Nine hundred German and fourteen thousand of their colossal troops from the German colony of Kamerun have crossed the border into Spanish Guinea, according to official announcement today. The troops have been disarmed and interned. This is taken here to indicate that the British and French campaign in Kamerun is nearing a conclusion.

## SERMON ON THE PRODIGAL SON BY REV. DR. R. W. BENNETT

In the Central Christian Church last evening the Pastor, Rev. Dr. R. W. Bennett, delivered the first of a series of sermons on a subject of great interest, "The Prodigal Son." Last evening's address concerned "A Selfish Character" and the preacher treated it in a masterly fashion, being unusually impressive. The service was eloquent, Miss Nettie Stanley contributing a pretty and well-rendered solo.

Dr. Bennett, selected his text from the gospel of St. Luke, Chapter 15, verses 12 and 19. "Father give me the portion of goods that falleth to me"; and, "Make me as one of thy hired servants." The greatest argument in favour of religion, he said, was a truly religious gathering. A dozen enthusiastic Christians working in harmony to draw ungodly men up to their level of thinking, men who in their business were known to be truthful, whose scales did not cheat, whose accounts are true to facts—would do more to comfort the world of Jesus Christ than anything else he had ever heard or known of. Of course, he continued, he knew there were a great many of that kind of people alive in the world to-day; and yet, because they were not recognized in daily life as they should be the world somehow or other kept aloof from the Church that professed to manufacture that kind of character. After further remarks in this direction, the preacher said:

The Church is not a hospital merely for convalescents or cripples; the church is not a hot house for people who grow cold and sickly outside. The church is a school in which men and women are supposed to learn a word of Godly living, to learn how to conquer sin, to learn how to live the way God meant them to live. The Church is more than a school; the Church is a home. The Church should be a home for every new-born soul, every man and woman who call themselves by the name of Christian. The Church should be a home in which there are brothers and sisters, and a home in which a narrow, selfish, bigotted character is a being unknown and yet, subsequent speculation has almost hidden from view the simple and original teaching of Jesus Christ. I am very much afraid that men and women to-day have not very much outgrown the old-fashioned pagan idea of religion. Instead of men and women interpreting the word "service" as to serve, they have an idea that religion means that you have either to employ gorgeous ceremonial or you have to frighten people with threats some kind of future plague. Have men and women, grasped this, that when they become a Christian they don't merely bow at the foot of the cross for what God can give them but in humble submission say: "Oh God, take my life and let it be consecrated to thee." "I wonder if you have ever taken the trouble to find out what a character is. A Christian character is the leaning to righteousness and unselfishness and assumes to be so. We look up into the face of the Nazarene and glory because he has borne our blame. But do not carry that thought too far. I warn you tonight not to fall into the idea that Jesus Christ is going to act as our proxy in honesty, or charity, or unselfishness. It you could only take the thought of something after death, out of death; if you were only to take the thought of punishment out of death then you would bear a great deal less about death bed than I do. I doubt not that Jesus Christ of Calvary is able to save a man from the very verge of hell; but that man, that death bed penitent will stand before his Lord and the Holy Angels a twisted, bent, crippled, distorted character.

The preacher gave practical illustrations in support of his arguments. Dr. Bennett said: "there are too many people who are saying, 'oh God give me the portion that falleth to me.' They are not willing to submit themselves in obedience to the service of God. This man was more wily than he became a servant than when he boasted he was a son. Are you sons of God? The more you feel your relationship to him, and glory in that relationship the more will you go out to serve him."

## HUNS ADMIT FAILURE OF TURKISH CAMPAIGN IN CAUCASUS

LONDON, February 6.—German sources admit the failure of the Turkish campaign in the Caucasus, says a Central News despatch from Amsterdam.

There has been heavy fighting ten miles south of Erzerum, where the Turks sent reinforcements from Trebizond, according to the despatch. The Turks are declared to have fought stubbornly, but were compelled to retreat.

Eighty wounded Turkish officers and five thousand wounded men have arrived at Trebizond, the message adds.

## Thirty Mey Have Perished

HUNTINGTON, West Va., Feb. 5.—The Sam Brown a Pittsburg steamboat, sank within a few minutes after her boilers exploded in the Ohio River opposite this city to-day. A great majority of the members of the crew, approximately thirty, are believed to have perished. Not more than six survivors reached the Ohio side of the river following the explosion. Debris from the boat landed on both sides of the river. The boat was blown to pieces and sank immediately.

## STEAMER MISSING.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 5.—The steamer Onward Ho was missing in Northern British Columbia waters with a crew of thirty-seven men. Storms still prevail in the Province and a foot of snow fell here last night.

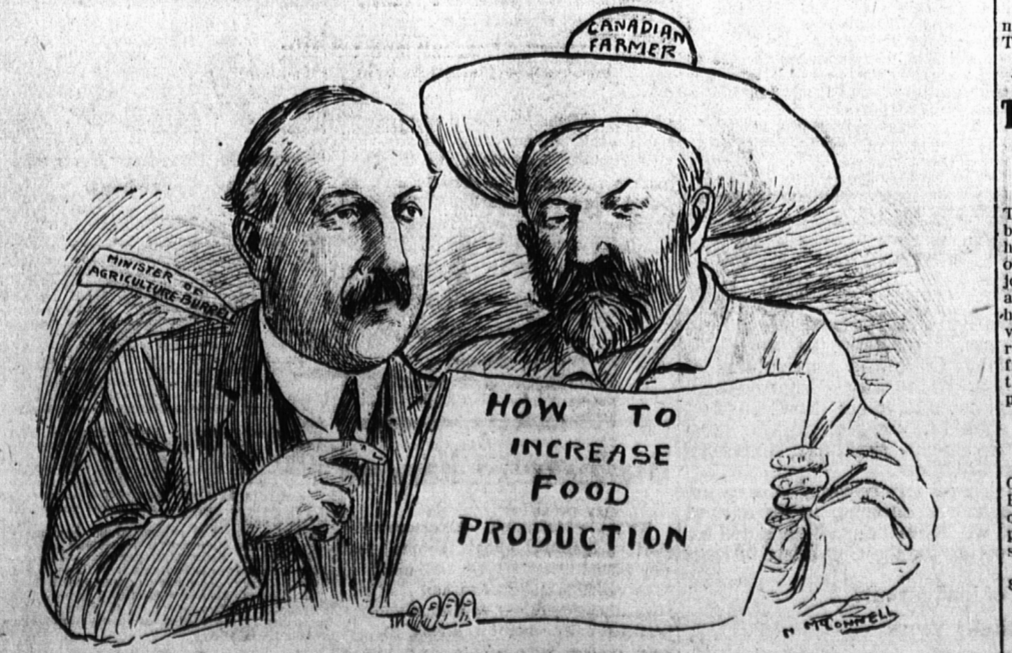
