### THE SUBSIDY RESOLUTIONS.

The subsidies now paid by the Dominion to the several Provinces are made up of (1) a rate per head of population and (2) a grant in support of the provincial Government and Legislature. The per capita rate is 80 cents per head, but is limited in the case of Ontario and Quebec to their population as it was in 1891 and in the case of the other Provinces is payable on the actual population as shown by the census until such numbers reach 400,000.

The grant in aid of the Government and Legislature was on a graduated scale, rising from \$30,000 in the case of Prince Edward Island to \$80,000 for Ontario. What is now proposed is to increase these grants about threefold, giving Ontario and Quebec \$240,000 each, P. E. Island \$100,000, and other Provinces in proportion, while at the same time extending the 80 cents per head to the present population of Ontario and Quebec instead of limiting it to their population as it was in 1891.

It is proposed to do away with the limits of population on which a per capita subsidy is now paid, so that any Province may receive 80 cents per head on any population it may attain up to 2,500,000, and 60 cents per head on any number in excess of that figure, while on the other hand a Province which may be so unfortunate as to lose a portion of its population would lose just so much of its per capita subsidy. As things stand at present Prince Edward Island receives 80 cents per head on her population as it was in 1891. Under the new arrangement she would receive 80 cents per head on her diminished population or some \$5,000 a year less on that score. The Guardian has taken objection to the proposed changes as unfair to the smaller Provinces, and notably our own, but we are strongly convinced that the Provincial subsidies ought to be increased.

What each Province would gain under the proposed changes in increased per capita subsidies and grants in support of their several Governments and Legislatures would appear to be as here set down.

Our Province would get \$70,000 additional in the way of grant for its Government and Legislature yearly but would lose five or six thousand on its per capita subsidy, owing to falling population. The big Provinces would gain enormously in both ways, and we would be contributors toward making the rich Provinces richer.

### THE SUNDAY OBSERVANCE BILL.

The Sunday Observance Bill now before Parliament has received the endorsement of Protestant and Catholic dignitaries and authorities and of the Lord's Day Alliance on the other hand it is strongly objected to by Jews and Seventh Day Adventists, who are not very numerous in Canada. Their religious beliefs require them to observe Saturday as the day of rest, and they complain that the new Bill, like the existing laws which it will supersede, compels them to abstain from working on Sunday, and so have but five days of the week in which to earn their living. But much more general objections will arise from those on the one hand who find the new Bill too strict for their convenience, or on the other hand not strict enough for their religious beliefs and convictions. It prohibits all Sunday work except works of necessity or mercy, but this is broadly interpreted so as not to prevent the carriage of mails or passengers to their destination, and apparently will not prevent the running of street cars or ferry boats.

It in no way prohibits sports or games on Sunday, except that there must be no competition for prizes and no gate money or admission fee charged. It will apparently be quite lawful to play golf, base-ball, football, tennis or engage in any of the ordinary recreations or pastimes of the week on a Sunday, subject only to the one condition that there shall be no money business or pecuniary gain in connection therewith. An exception is made of shooting at a target on Sunday, which is prohibited, apparently because the noise might disturb others than those engaged in the recreation. A good feature of the Bill as it stands is the prohibition of Sunday steamboat excursions specially gotten up for the day. But in several respects the new Bill comes far short of the provisions of the Sunday law hitherto in operation in this Province.

Some western newspapers profess to believe that if the Bill becomes law it will be a dead letter in the Northwest and in British Columbia because of its Sabbatarian strictness. The immigrants from continental Europe and from the United States are not accustomed to the restraints which it will impose, while to the majority in our own Province the bill will seem lax in its provisions. Indeed it seems a pity that we could not retain our own provincial law.

And it is to be observed that any Sunday law passed by a Province before the Union with Canada is quite valid until it shall be repealed by the federal Parliament, or superseded by contrary provisions enacted by that body. It may be possible yet to permit portions of the provincial laws on this subject to remain unrepaled.

The resolution introduced in Parliament by Mr. Hughes M. P. and ably supported by other Island Members with a view to having the Union Act amended and our lost representation restored, ought to be adopted by Parliament, but we fear it may not be. As yet it is only the Maritime Provinces that have been reduced below their original representation in the Commons, Nova Scotia now has but 18 instead of her original 19 members, New Brunswick 13 instead of 15 and P. E. Island 4 instead of 6. No other Province having lost or being likely to lose enough Members to come below the number allotted if at first, they may not care to assist us in regaining our rights. Still it is well to agitate the question. The sense of justice may be awakened, even if it be now dormant.


