### PRIEST SOUGHT BY MOHAMMEDAN

PORTLAND, Me., Dec. 19.—About to die in a strange land, thousands of miles from his country and people, Chookoo Miam, Indian seaman and patient at the Marine Hospital here, fears he will not be given proper burial and has begged Joseph T. Mulvenny, British Vice-Consul, to have a Mohammedan priest brought to Portland so that the rites of his faith may be administered.

Chookoo, arriving at this port aboard the British clay steamer Taransay, is afflicted with tuberculosis, and authorities believe he can live only a few days.

With the Dying Moslem ignorant of English, no one here excepting his shipmate, Ishmael Rehanoody, knows which of the 400 languages and dialects of India he speaks. In broken English the shipmate told the British Consul his countryman's desire for spiritual solace.

Mohammedan law requires that Moslems be buried in a certain manner. Any Mohammedan can perform this ceremony, and under ordinary circumstances Ishmael would take care of the matter for his shipmate. But with Ishmael regaining his health, he fears he may have to rejoin the Taransay before the death of Chookoo.

Chookoo is a native of the village of Noachally, in northern India.

### TURKEYS SELL AT \$1.00 A HEAD

TORONTO, Dec. 20.—Christmas turkeys are said by commission men here to be costing anywhere from 23 to 29 a pound by the ton, delivered in Toronto.

Inquiry among poultrymen finds them uncertain as to what the value of turkey is this year, and many farmers are holding back expecting higher prices.

In Alberta, where there are hundreds of tons of turkeys, farmers have been offered, and many of them have accepted, the lowest price on record—one dollar a head for three flocks, the birds running from 12 to 13 pounds each. This price means 6 to 8 cents a pound. Hon. Charles Stewart, M. P., for Edmonton, who is in the city today, stated that whole flocks of turkeys through his district, east of Edmonton, were valued at only \$1.00 a head for birds weighing from 14 to 18 pounds. Regarding chickens, he said some 5,000 had been taken by the pool in Alberta, and the farmers received practically nothing for them.

Mr. Stewart mentioned, as one thing, that has come under his personal observation, that a farmer brought in 90 bushels of wheat—not the best grade, of course—and took away as his dividend only \$1.80, or 2 cents a bushel. Barley and oats are selling at 3 to 6 cents a bushel.

Mr. Stewart, like other Westerners, thinks the period of depression will be short-lived, and that following it there will be better times for the farmers than ever.

### FLOATING POWER HOUSE INVENTED

PROVIDENCE, R.I., Dec. 20. Necessity continues to be the mother of invention. A new type of auxiliary plant that is unique on the Atlantic seaboard is the floating power house. Faced with the problem of serving industrial communities along the Maine coast in order to insure a continuity of service in time of drought or other emergencies, a public service company recently purchased a 5000 ton Shipping Board

structure and interior fittings and all of its preceding equipment, and installed in the hull two modern 10,000 kilowatt generators. The floating power plant, the prerequisite of which is its mobility, must be towed from place to place. Its routine duties are simple. 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
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
