Taber at the last meeting if they would consider giving them a franchise to run the radial road proposed over the streets of Taber, and if it should be favorably entertained the syndicate would place full particulars before the council at their next regular meeting. The council has replied to the effect that it will be pleased to have full particulars of the proposed railway submitted before them at any time in the near future.—Calgary News Telegram.
