An appeal case, the King vs. Maurice Griffin, drunken driving, was postponed until the June term, on motion of R. R. Bell.

The case of H.K.S. Hemming vs. Peter Stewart, debt, by agreement was set down by order made in Chambers.

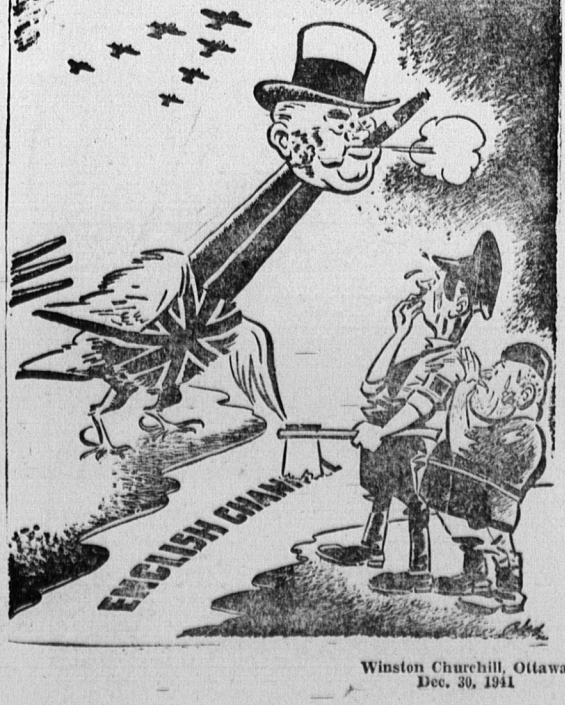
In the case of Matthews vs. Matthews, the Judge said that the full Court would be convened shortly and the case would then be dealt with.

BOSTON, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Defenseman Flash Hollett, accounted for all of Boston Bruins' scoring tonight when they reached their halfway mark of the National Hockey League with a 2-1 victory over Detroit Red Wings before 12,100 at the Boston Garden.

Although refreshed by a week's rest, the Bruins were outplayed by the Red Wings, in action for the fifth time in eight nights, until Hollett beat goalie Johnny Mowers with a sizzling 55-foot shot about halfway through the second period.
