TO ERECT PAPER MILL IN BRAZIL

RIO DE JANEIRO, August 12.—Representatives of a Swedish company have made proposals to the Brazilian government looking to the establishment of a pulp paper manufacturing plant in the state of Parana. Among other advantages asked of the government is that of free entry of necessary machinery.

According to the company's representatives there is an abundance of necessary material for pulp paper manufacture in Parana and other states.

Local publishers, who have for several months been occupied with problems growing out of the scarcity and high price of imported print paper, are unanimously in favor of the manufacturing project in the meantime they are meeting frequently to discuss measures of economy when reduction in the size of newspapers and increased advertising rates and subscription prices were under consideration.

BANDIT IS SAID TO HAVE MADE A CONFESSION

LETHBRIDGE, Alta., August 12.—The preliminary hearing of the bandit Bassett will take place in Lethbridge either on Saturday or Monday. Witnesses will be brought here from Bellevue rather than taking the risk of sending Bassett among his friends in the Pass for the holding of the preliminary trial.

Conductor Sam Jones, who was in charge of the train held in a week-end last Monday, today identified the man held in the cell here as the bandit who handled the case and who shot at him when he reached for the bell cord to stop the train.

Bassett is said to have made a full confession to the police, stating that he had shot the bandit here as he was the most of the week from the hold-up. The police will not, however, make the public hearing until after the preliminary hearing.

Chocolate Pie.
Half cup grated chocolate, two cups scalded milk, four tablespoons flour, three-quarter cup sugar, three egg yolks, half teaspoon vanilla three egg whites one-third cup sugar.
Melt chocolate over hot water, add milk very slowly, stirring until smooth, then add flour and three-fourths cup sugar mixed together. Stir and cook over hot water until thick, cover and cook ten minutes. Beat egg yolks and light, add to first mixture and cook one minute. Coll, add vanilla, pour into a crust already baked and cover with a meringue made of egg whites and one-third cup sugar. Bake slowly until brown. Serve cold.

ARE YOU OR THE WEEDS MASTER?

Last week we saw what was no doubt a field of hay, but which really was a good crop of weeds. It is a good quality of seed. It will hardly be worth cutting. Yet there must have been five or six acres of that stuff. On the same trip several fields of fall wheat were seen, which contained an oat field, one of which was infested with thistles, and several grain fields were simply yellow with mustard. Some people seem to consider that they can grow just as good crops with weeds as without. But weeds require moisture, plant food and room. Indeed so much do they frequently require that the cultivated crops are crowded out together in spots. These farms which are as yet comparatively clean should be kept clean. Grain fields should be rogued; the hold crops kept clean and fence corners cut. Where weeds are extremely bad a smother crop should be sown, which will smother the weeds after summer cultivation or the field summer fallow. After harvest cultivation wherever possible is also important.

Full cut and hoe weeds. Better let them go to seed, should be done, to lessen the value of grain and seed for feeding and for seedling purposes, and lower the value of the farm. During the past few years they have been gaining too much headway. A general campaign is necessary.

SOVIET RUSSIA DEMANDS THAT WORKERS BE ARMED

MOFOW, August 12.—That the armistice terms drawn up for Poland and Soviet Russia include a clause demanding that the workers be armed as a guarantee to the rights of the Polish proletariat, was indicated in semi-official information gained here today.

It was said that, while Russia acknowledges such a demand, it is unprepared in history, the Soviet let considered the action necessary for the safety of Russia and at the same time to provide a militia adequate for the national defence and which it would be impossible to use for imperialistic ends.

The general impression semi-officially expressed here is that Poland will accept the armistice terms proffered here by the Soviet government.

Some of the terms as they were received by M. Kowalew, the Soviet emissary in London, was made public in London on Tuesday. The resume then published made no reference to a clause providing for the arming of the Polish workers.

INTERESTING ANNOUNCEMENT

The ranch has been under the management of Mr. Fred Andrews and has been one of the most successful in the province this year. The 39 pairs have today 97 living pups or an average of 2.2 to the pair. This year the management of Mr. Fred Andrews has been very favorably with any ranch in the province having strictly 1919 pups.

The policy of the management was to select the very best foxes that money could buy and feed the very best food. Results have justified this course. The number of pairs can be ranched will be limited to fifteen so parties who desire to take advantage of this should speak early.
