FIRST COURT PRESENTS IMPRESSIVE SCENE

LONDON, April 2—Decollette was de rigueur for the season's first court Friday night.

The third Chamberlain laid down the law to the matrons and debutantes presented to the King and Queen, insisting that costume regulations sometimes ignored in the past be strictly observed.

A few elderly women who feared catching cold were allowed to wear gowns with high neck lines. The rest, however, though dignified and unostentatious, were décollette, many having off-the-shoulder necklines.

Full length trains, the traditional three feathers in the head-dress and jewelry also were decreed, the latter giving court jewellers opportunity to evolve new styles in the increasingly popular tiara. The 1935 model, about one inch deep, is worn halo fashion from the top of the head to the ears.

Ten Canadian women will be presented at tonight's court.

The Queen had diamonds and emeralds in her corsage and hair, all her jewels being set off by the famous Kohinoor diamond. She wore a gown of opalescent paillettes with the blue ribbon of the Order of the Garter across her breast.

The King wore a bright scarlet uniform as Colonel-in-Chief of the Life Guards.

Gathered about the thrones, which were draped in scarlet and emblazoned with the royal coat of arms, were the Prince of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of York, the Earl of Harewood, Prince and Princess Arthur of Connaught, the Duke and Duchess of Beaufort and the Marquess of Cambridge.

The average age of the debutantes was younger than usual, girls of 17 and 18 participating in the spectacular levy, and obviously getting an intense thrill out of it.

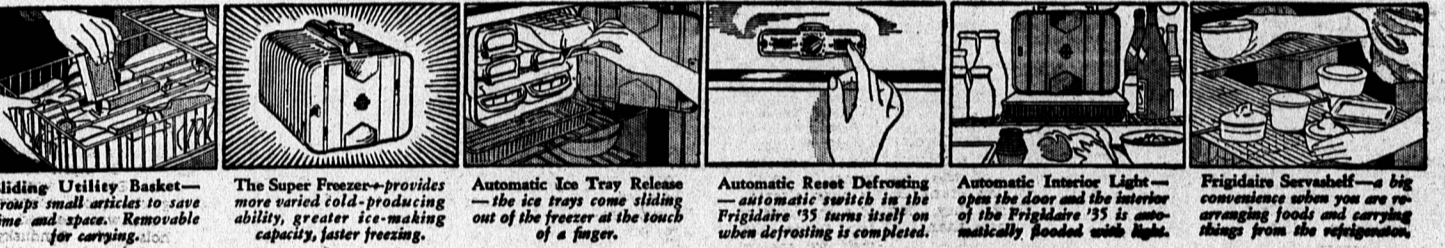

BOGGER CHALLENGES MEIGHEN TO DEBATE

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

MONTREAL, April 1—A challenge to E. Hon. Arthur Meighen government leader in the Senate, to a debate was made before members of the Canadian Club here today by Mayor G. G. McGeer, of Vancouver. Mayor McGeer was commenting on the statement made by E. Hon. Mr. Meighen here last night describing social credit, inflation and similar plans for economic readjustment as "lunacy."

RED CLOVER

Canada this spring about three million pounds. The normal annual Canadian consumption is more than this being between four and five million pounds.

The continued low purchasing power of farmers will of course have an effect in reducing seed purchases, but the relatively low price for red clover seed, as compared with alskie and timothy, will probably increase the preference for red to the extent that the total supplies of red clover seed available will likely all be needed before the season is over.

Most of last year's red clover seed crop in Canada was grown in Eastern Ontario, and Quebec, which is fortunate from the standpoint of seed hardness and purity. The greater part of this seed is now in the hands of the seed houses for resale, but considerable quantities are still held by the growers in the Plantagenet area in Eastern Ontario and in the Montreal district in Quebec.

Further information as to sources of supply may be obtained from the Seed Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.
