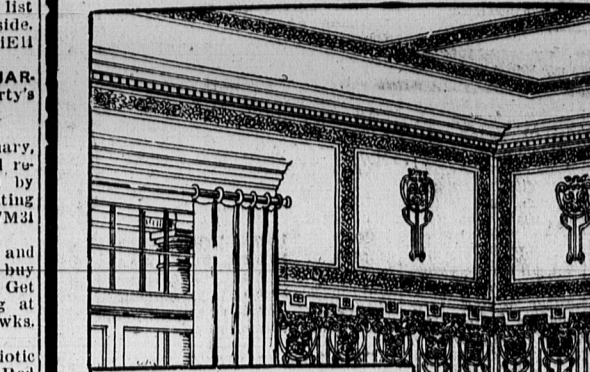

Star," they were loaded with all kinds of first-aid as well as permanent-aid materials. A small forest of timber was needed to supply the 150,000 lb. of metal went into the struts rods, and as for the giant canvas, it would be the finest thing in the world to cover three or four football gridirons with and keep them snug and dry, and it could do it, too, for its figures showed a total of 220,000 square yards.
