Definite Flu Cure Expected

LONDON, Dec. 14.—(U. P.)—The British press, commenting today on the reported discovery of the influenza germ by Prof. I. S. Falk, of Chicago, said that the British doctors David Thomson and Robert Thomson reported in January, 1927, the discovery of "unusual streptococcus, which we have a certain amount of reason for suspecting caused influenza."

The two British doctors, who were of St. Paul's Hospital, devised a vaccine which was successful in many influenza cases but not in all. The germ was named bacillus influenza.

Can Develop Acute Disease in Monkeys by Spraying Throats With Culture.

CHICAGO, Dec. 14.—What is said to be the most important medical discovery made in recent years, the isolation of the germ that causes epidemic influenza, was announced today by Prof. I. S. Falk of the University of Chicago.

ture in which it is kept alive slightly greenish and has a rough, porous surface. Fourteen members of the bacteriology department, all of whom developed influenza during the work, toiled 16 hours a day to get samples.

A large part of the money used to buy monkeys and pay expenses was furnished by Julius Rosenwald and the Metropolitan Life Insurance company. "It also developed that this microbe develops in the blood the power to clump, or agglutinate, the blood," said a report of the discovery.
