THE LANGEVIN BLOCK IS DAMAGED BY FIRE

Caused By Faulty Wiring— Causes Thousands of Dollars Loss—One of the Finest Blocks in the Capital City—Built During the Regime of Sir Hector Langevin. A City Pride.

OTTAWA, Sept. 4.—(Special) — The Langevin Block the largest and newest of the departmental buildings at Ottawa was damaged by fire today. Faulty wiring started the blaze which caused several thousand dollars damage before it was extinguished.

MONCTON AND A STREET RAILWAY

Railway City may Have Street Cars Matter Discussed at City Council Meeting

MONCTON, September 5. —(Special)— Moncton may have street railway.

At tonight's session of the council a motion was passed authorizing the legis- lation empowering the city of Moncton to construct, equip and maintain in the City Moncton and elsewhere in the parishes of Moncton and Shediac, in the county of Westmorland, a street railway or train- way, to be operated by electricity or other motive power and to be maintained and operated by the City Council or to lease the railway.

RAIN POSTPONES MONCTON RACES

MONCTON, N. B. Sept. 3.—Pouring rain this afternoon prevented the second day's horse races. A large crowd of outsiders came to attend the races, which up to 12 o'clock it was thought would take place, but shortly after a heavy rain set in last- ing all the afternoon. A meeting of the officers of the exhibition association and horsemen was held this evening to decide upon a postponement. Some horsemen objected to postponing until Sept. 15, as was suggested, therefore the races post- poning from day to day until a fine day and track in condition were adhered to. It is hardly possible the races can be held tomorrow, which means the horses will probably not be able to get away to St. John for Wednesday.

SERIOUS FIRE IN ST. JOHN N.B.

Bakery, Stable and Residence Destroyed By Flames—The Attendance Large at the Exhi- bition—Fine Weather Makes a Very Suc- cessful Day at the Grounds.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 4.—(Special)—A serious fire occurred in the north end tonight, the bakery, stable, and residence of Sinclair McKiel being totally destroyed and two adjoining houses gutted. McKiel's family were asleep when the fire broke out, and nearly perished before they were rescued. His loss is heavy and there is no insurance. The exhibition had another successful day. The fine weather brought larger crowds than yesterday, the attendance being over eleven thousand.

TERRIBLE TREPPOFF IS NOW RETIRED

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 3.—The Czar has placed General Dmitri Treppoff on the retired list. The order to this effect also includes his vacating the position of Governor of Peterhof Palace. This is the most significant step that has been taken by the Czar throughout the crisis. It was decided on this morn- ing, when the Emperor, after expressing sympathy with General Treppoff because of his continued ill-health, which is per- fectly genuine and is in the nature of angina pectoris, told him to cease all work and take a long rest. He thanked him heartily for his fidelity. The removal of Gen. Treppoff from the personal counsels of the palace leaves Premier Stolypin with a freer hand, but it does not necessarily mean a more ill- defined direction of policy, as "Mila" is now recognised as the regime is fighting for its existence. It is known that the Czar has been greatly disturbed recently be- cause of the insecurity near Peterhof, which culminated in the assassination of Gen. Mine.

INDIANS ARE GROWING BAD

VANCOUVER, September 3.—The rising of the Babine Indians, whose haunts are near the head waters of the Skeena river is of such a serious nature as to have com- pelled call for the militia. The author- ities on the Skeena river are declared to be utterly unable to cope with the situation, and it is stated that unless a force of militia is rushed north with all possible despatch there is grave danger that murder may be done. It is believed that a force of not less than a hundred militiamen is absolutely essential to the preservation of peace on the Babine, and no smaller body will be able to effect the arrest of the Indians, who have become so terribly excited.
