P. E. I. HOSPITAL ANNUAL MEETING

(Continued from page 1)

Building Committee
The report for the Building Committee for the new hospital was presented by Mr. James Paton as follows:

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen:

As Chairman of the new Hospital Building Committee, I have been requested to give a report of this important undertaking. At a meeting such as we have tonight, time does not permit giving a detailed review of the work performed by the committee since its inauguration at a meeting held in St. Paul's School room December 9th, 1930. Realizing the great responsibility we have assumed, we have taken the advice of one familiar with hospital building, who said, no type of structure needs as much preliminary study as a hospital before the plans and specifications are drawn. A great deal of correspondence and consultation has been made between the committee and the best hospital architects in Canada and United States. Plans and specifications have also been submitted by various architects and scrutinized by our medical staff and committee. Mr. B. Evan Parry of the Hospital Advisory Department of National Health, Ottawa, addressed a joint meeting of the Hospital Trustees, Executive Campaign Funds, Medical Staff and Building Committee. His advice on hospital architecture and equipment is considered the best that can be procured in Canada. Mr. Parry placed before the meeting recommendations for composition of plan, covering complete unit or new hospital, the proposition, after being discussed was passed over to our medical staff to consider more carefully, some few changes were suggested, and subsequently submitted to Mr. Parry and received his approval. While in Charlottetown, Mr. Parry made a visit to the proposed site for the new hospital and expressed himself as highly pleased with the situation. Notwithstanding all the correspondence, consultations, and information, the Committee had procured, they went further to complete their investigation, sent two of their members to Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto to consult architects and visit up-to-date hospitals, to find out where mistakes, if any, had been made in construction or equipment. The delegates were received graciously at the hospitals and escorted through the buildings by doctors, managers, and nurses. Much information was gathered that will be useful when plans are being prepared. At a meeting of the building committee held recently, Mr. James Govan was appointed architect, his reputation is widely known and stands high throughout Canada, he has this year alone had invitations to address no less than nine of the leading architectural and engineering societies, including the American Hospital Association, the Ontario Branch of the American Society of Heating and Ventilating Engineers, and the Architectural Association of Toronto. He has also contributed by request special papers to several journals in Canada and United States. Mr. Govan will arrive in Charlottetown on Thursday night, the following morning will consult with building committee and visit site at Brighton. On his return to Toronto he will at once commence work on plans, which probably will take about two months to complete. On completion, tenders will be asked and work on construction commenced soon after contract is signed.

ceive greater assistance from the City of Charlottetown and also from the outlying districts. We might call your attention to the figures in the report which show that eighty free patients came from the City last year and seventy nine from the country and, as the total amount of this free work cost the Hospital \$8,374, the City of Charlottetown must see that their \$1,000 subscription to the Hospital is out of all proportion to the benefit they are receiving. It might not be out of order to point out here that the City of Moncton gives an annual grant of \$10,000 to the general hospital.

New Building

The reason the Trustees are going into this matter so fully in this report is to try to impress everyone interested of the absolute necessity of getting further assistance. We are about to commence the building of a new and modern hospital, a hospital where our people can be as well taken care of as in the larger hospitals in Montreal, Toronto or New York. We are trying to give this service to our people but it is going to take money to do it and we want to impress upon the contributors to the Hospital the fact that they should assist us in taking the matter up with their representatives both of the Government and of the City and demand of them the further substantial increasing of the grants to the hospitals. We want every person interested to get this into their minds and take it seriously and on every opportunity talk to their representatives and demand that satisfactory action be taken. The crowded condition of the Hospital during the entire year just closed fully justifies the action of the Trustees in proceeding with the erection of the new Hospital.

Campaign

When we commenced the campaign organization, it was decided by the Trustees that they would assume the total amount of the expenses to be incurred and the public were told that every dollar that was subscribed by them to the campaign would be used for the building of the new Hospital. This promise has been fulfilled to the letter and every cent of the expenses has been paid by the Trustees. This leaves us with a debit balance this year of \$2,717.61 which we hope to pay off by the end of the year.

We wish particularly to call your attention to the amount of free work done during the year just closed. We believe this is the largest in the history of the work of this Hospital. In addition to this work that has been done absolutely free, the Hospital also makes a loss on all ward patients which we treat at the ward rate of \$1.50 a day and there is also quite a large amount of unpaid bills every year which does not appear under the heading of free work. We cannot hope for this amount of free work to grow less. In fact, it is more likely to increase during the next year or two at least because we cannot hope for the prosperous times that we have enjoyed for some years past.

Medical Staff

It is always with a very deep sense of obligation that we refer to the work of the medical staff of our hospital. Their interest in this institution seems to increase year by year and they are always seeking better methods for carrying on their work. They give a great deal of time lecturing to the nurses and in doing anything they can to further the interests of the Hospital. We have stressed the amount of free work that has been done in the Hospital this year and we must remember that it is not only the Hospital that takes part in this free work. Every one of those patients has been treated absolutely free by some member of the Staff.

Trustees' Report

The following Trustees' Report for the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1931 was presented by Mr. W. K. Rogers, chairman.

Your trustees herewith submit the forty eighth annual report of the Prince Edward Island Hospital.

The principal features of the year's work are as follows:

Increased number of patients treated; fewer number of patient days, which goes to show that our Hospital is, in keeping with all modern hospitals, lessening the number of days which it is necessary for a patient to be confined to the hospital; very greatly increased number of obstetrical patients, showing that the advantages of this department of the Hospital are being more

Cash Received

The percentages should not be taken as an indication that each individual subscriber has paid the full quota due March 1. Some are over, and some under paid. The percentages are based on the general average.

It will be noticed that Charlottetown subscribers have fallen considerably short on payments due March 1. This may be, in part due to a rumour, current in the city, that building operations would not be started this season.

Now that it is definitely understood that construction will commence this summer, we feel that subscribers will realize that it is absolutely necessary that the amount due June 1, together with arrears, be paid promptly and in full, in order to provide the necessary funds to carry on the work.

The Committee considers, that up to this date, the Fund is in a healthy and satisfactory condition.

First Campaign

The following report was presented by Hon. Dr. F. R. Hearty on the first campaign fund:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I herewith beg to submit the eighth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the First Campaign Fund of the Prince Edward Island Hospital up to April 30th, 1931.

On this occasion the Report will be brief as only a small amount has been collected from subscribers since the last statement, which was up to the 30th of April, 1930, and submitted one year ago.

If you will refer to the Report of last year, which will be found on page 12 of the Hospital Report, you will find that the first campaign fund had to its credit on April 30th, 1930, the sum of \$36,497.84. During the past twelve months we have collected from sixteen subscribers \$2,448.32, and from interest on bonds \$1,556.44 (we actually collected in interest \$1,987.69, but of this amount \$431.25 had to be returned to capital account as we had paid that amount for accrued interest when purchasing the bonds). This makes the total collections for this year \$4,004.76 from which is deducted a charge of \$3.00 for rent of safety deposit box, leaving a net increase of \$4,001.76 for the year. This added to the \$36,497.84, makes the amount to the credit of the Fund on April 30th, 1931, \$40,499.60.
