GRAND TRUNK SYSTEM NEWS ITEMS SAT. 10 MAY, 1913.

A despatch received yesterday afternoon at Grand Trunk Railway headquarters in Montreal announces the opening of navigation on the Upper Fraser River. Commencing May 15th, Foley, Welch & Stewart's big vessel will run on a regular schedule to Fort George from the End of Steel on the Grand Trunk Pacific main line in connection with that Company's train service.

Advice is reported to have been received by officials of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway from the Great Northern Railway stating that that Company will be able to connect with the G. T. P. Regina-Boundary branch as soon as it reaches the International line, which will probably be some time this year. The junction point of the two roads will be somewhere east of Portal, Sask.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship "Prince George" has recently completed her one hundredth round trip between Vancouver and Prince Rupert, having started on the northern schedule in July 1910.

A construction outfit of some 15 teams is now busily at work on the Grand Trunk Pacific grade a mile north of Weyburn, Sask., and headed for the town. Another similar outfit is at work some miles farther east, filling in a two mile stretch on which work was held up last year. The contractors state that the whole of the grade will be completed into Weyburn ready for the steel by the end of next month. A bridging gang is expected within the next few days to begin work on the Souris River bridge near the town terminals and the construction parties have instructions to continue grading in a south westerly direction after passing through the town.

During the past week 8 special trains have passed through the Grand Trunk's Bonaventure station at Montreal with about 3,000 passengers from Ontario and Western Canada from Europe via Halifax, Quebec and Montreal.

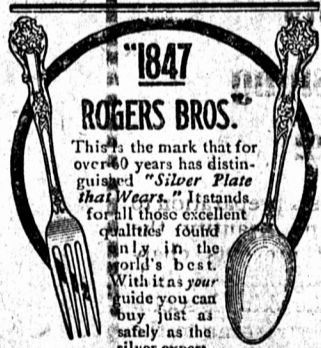
