XMAS REGISTERED MAIL.—As previously stated in these columns, the Christmas mail coming into and going out of this province this season surpassed all other occasions. The fact that there were no fewer than 3852 registered letters and packets dealt with last week at the General Post-Office in Charlottetown alone gives an idea of the extraordinary amount of mail handled, and as affording some indication of the tremendous pressure on the Post-Office Staff in Charlottetown it may be stated that all these letters and checked three or four times; or the work of sorting this class of mail which formerly was done on the Empress having been undertaken by the C. P. O. staff. In comparison with the registered mail of this time last year, last weeks mail was considerably greater.

There was a very large attendance, the school being packed to the doors. A very interesting musical and literary program was rendered by the pupils in a highly creditable manner. (From Yesterday's Evening Guardian) FUNERAL.—Yesterday the funeral of the late Edward Coady, Charlottetown, took place yesterday afternoon to St. Dunstan's Cathedral and was very largely attended, the deceased gentleman being well and favorably known in his home city. The funeral services were conducted by Father Duffy, the pallbearers being: Mayor Lyons, Captain Ryan, Mr. James Eden, Mr. Richard Grant, Mr. R. F. Maddigan and Mr. M. Hennessey.

'STOLE A CARCASS OF PORK.—A thief one night last week carried away a choice carcass of pork and a lot of beef from the schooner lying at the Dominion wharf, owned and commanded by Captain Hubert Theriault, says the North Sydney Herald. The vessel arrived from Prince Edward Island last week with a cargo of produce, and included in the lot was the pork and beef. Before leaving the vessel the captain hoisted the meat up in the rigging with the intention of having it in firm condition for the morning, when he intended taking it home for his own use in the winter. When he arrived next morning with a team he discovered the loss, and since then no tidings have been heard of the stolen goods.

HIGH COST OF LIVING.—Some two or three owners of as many cargoes of P. E. Island produce at the wharves, for reasons best known to themselves, jumped the prices on potatoes five cents a bushel, and other articles proportionately last week, just as soon as P. E. Island dealers had disposed of their cargoes. The North Sydney Herald intimates that next year a number of residents intend chartering an outside vessel, possibly three of them, and will carry their own produce. In Charlottetown potatoes sold at from 28 to 30 cents a bushel, while in Sydney they are 35 cents. Turnips at the former place were sold for 12 to 13 cents. Here 35 cents is asked. 70 cents for carrots and 90 cents for parsnips.
