Paton & Co's show windows were the centre of attraction yesterday. There was displayed in them over six hundred limericks the result of the recent limerick ads which have appeared and also the prizes which the successful competitors are to receive.

Hunting takes the pride of place in the March number of "Rod and Gun and Motor Sports in Canada" published by W. J. Taylor, at Woodstock, Ont., which has been received for review. From the fascinating sport of caribou hunting in Newfoundland one is taken to deer stalking in the Gatineau Valley, hunting on a Quebec preserve, a successful hunt in Muskoka, while an unsuccessful one in New Brunswick proves that hunters are sometimes prepared to tell of their failures as well as to boast of their successes. The C.P.R. Wolf Hunt is told about, while a bear hunt is also described. These papers are varied by an excellent one on the Bloodhound and a thoughtful and poetical address before the Canadian Club at Toronto entitled "The Protection of the Wild and the Things of the Wild" by Cy Warman is given in full. Some rough backwoods experiences show the reality as compared with the glitter of the life on the frontiers of civilization, though the latter must retain its attractions for many men. Good illustrations are a feature of this number and the departments are all abreast of the other contents of the magazine, making it creditable alike to the publisher and the Dominion, the attractions of which from a sport loving point of view it presents to the world.

Cy Warman, the well known author and journalist, writing on "Prince Rupert" in The Canadian Magazine, for March, just received, says: "Prince Rupert is new and attractive. It is to be a model city in every sense of the word. It guards what is said to be the finest natural harbor on the coast, if not in the world. It is the terminal town of a transcontinental railway which bids fair to surpass anything ever yet attempted in the way of railway construction on this continent, crossing from ocean to ocean without a single mile of mountain grade or grade that can by any stretch of imagination be considered an obstacle to the economical operation of the road. Prince Rupert is also at the end of the long portage on the shortest route around the world. Any scheme which has for its ultimate object the swift circling of the sphere must reckon Prince Rupert on its right-of-way. The mineral wealth of all that vast mountain region, the forest products of Northern British Columbia, as well as the food products of the Prairie Provinces and the fur of the far north—that is to say, all the export wealth of this resourceful Dominion originating north and west of the South Saskatchewan, bound for the Orient by the Occidental route—will funnel down and pass out by way of Prince Rupert."

Commercial firms says the Montreal Witness are beginning to realize that Christian employees are valuable assets. One may judge from an illustration given by Mr. Budge to his Bible class on Sunday. While in Winnipeg recently, he said, a business man, head of a big firm, complained to him that he had found it almost impossible to get reliable employees to fill responsible positions. The temptations of the city were too much for them, and his firm had found it necessary to put private detectives on the track of some of its highly placed employees, to find out how they spent their evenings, and had been horrified at the result. Many were leading vicious lives, and an examination of the books of some of them showed defalcations. The firm was obliged to let these men go, generally without assigning a reason, and had no guarantee that their successors would be better. The Y.M.C.A. seeks to instill into the minds of the boys and young men such principles as will make them worthy of the confidence and trust of employees. As the topics discussed in the boys and men's meetings and bible classes are most practical in their bearing on commercial life.

A catalogue of the Birds of Prince Edward Island has just been issued by John McSwain, of this city, who is the recognized authority in this Province on this particular subject. Mr. McSwain says: "This catalogue of birds of Prince Edward Island has been compiled chiefly from a series of field notes, begun in 1895 and continued to the present time. It contains the names of two hundred and three birds seen by the writer during this period of thirteen years, and a supplementary list of thirteen additional birds stated to occur in Prince Edward Island in the 'Catalogue on Canadian Birds, by Prof. Macoun. There is a similar list of four species from 'Birds of Prince Edward Island,' by the late Francis Bain. There are few works which make special reference to the birds of the Island. The most important is the interestingly written book of Mr. Bain just mentioned, which describes one hundred and fifty-two birds. It was published in 1891. Besides this, Mr. Bain, in his 'Natural History of Prince Edward Island,' devoted a section to the birds found here, and he wrote two or more magazine articles on the same subject. 'Progress and Prospects of Prince Edward Island,' 1861, by C. Birch Bagster, contains a list of birds. 'A Manual of the Geography and Natural and Civil History of Prince Edward Island,' 1861, by Rev. D. Sutherland, has a chapter on birds. These, with some articles which have appeared in the Island newspapers and 'The Prince Edward Island Magazine,' make up the ornithological literature of Prince Edward Island. Some tables on migration are appended to the catalogue. The nomenclature is that of the American Ornithologists' Union 'Check-List,' and the numbers in parentheses refer to that work."
