JOHN CANNUCK GETS THE MITTEN.

According to a cable despatch the British Government, solicited to have Newfoundland comfortably married and settled, so to speak, recently approached Sir Robert Bond on the question of an union with Canada. His answer was that "Newfoundland in other desires or needs confederation. The oldest British Colony can maintain the most pleasant relations with her Canadian kindred, but she intends to paddle her own canoe." So there you are.

The Ancient Sister out in the mid Atlantic wishes it to be distinctly understood that she is wholly committed to single blessedness. Once on a time there was a man whose name was John Cannuck, but he was not for Terra Nova. Once on a time there was a man whose name was Jonathan, but that is another story. Terra has had other, mind you. It is not that fellows have not come a wooing.

Terra Nova has weighed the advantages and the disadvantages and decided to live and die an old maid. She will keep house by herself, catch her own fish and paddle her own canoe. Out of the fog borne on the east wind comes the chilling answer to John Cannuck, pitched in a shrill key, "You needn't come a courting me any more. It's no use. I've made up my mind, as I told you ever so many times. I'm not in for any John Anderson, my job business. Do you hear me? I'm a going to paddle my own canoe!"

The fact is that John Cannuck has got the mitten. He can't deny that he paid some attentions. Awy back in the sixties when he first thought of housekeeping, and again in the eighties and still again in the nineties he proposed. And each time he offered a good, or better, or still better marriage settlement. But Terra Nova was always reluctant. At first, behind her fish net, she said, "not just now John." Next time, after, declining over the settlement she said "No, John." But now, when she lifts that paddle threateningly, stamps her ample foot and shrieks "No," with a voice like a fog horn, there is nothing for John Cannuck to do but go away back by the Rocky Mountains and sit down.

As usual since 1872 the Prohibitionists of the United States have put a ticket in the field for the Presidency and Vice Presidency—Silas C. Swallow of Pennsylvania for the first place and George W.

Carroll of Texas for the less important office. Of course this ticket is not expected to win. It will be ground up between the great upper and nether millstones of the Republican and Democratic parties. In 1872 the Prohibitionist candidate got less than 6,000 votes. Twenty years later the vote reached 261,000. In 1900 it fell off to 200,000. But it is deemed expedient to keep the prohibition banner flying. Truth crushed to earth shall rise again. There are some at least who still hope to see a prohibition President seated in the White House.

Judge Parker if he is to win the Presidency must carry a number of States that Bryan failed to carry in 1900. At the election of four years ago McKinley got 292 votes in the electoral college and Bryan 155. Now by increase of population there are 29 additional votes to be divided. The southern states carried by Bryan have now an aggregate of 151 votes. McKinley is pretty sure to go Democratic this year, and that will add eight votes making 159. Parker must have 239 votes to win. Where will he get the 80 votes still required in the northern and western group of states? Bryan carried Colorado, Idaho, Nevada and Montana, which have 14 votes between them. Giving Parker all these and New York with its 36 votes he would still need 30 more. It hardly seems possible that he can get them, but strange things happen sometimes in an election.

There was an increasing note of urgency and emphasis in the communications from the imperial authorities in recalling Lord Dundonald. First Mr. Arnold Forster told Parliament that Lord Dundonald as an officer on half pay "could not be deprived of the right to take an active part in public life" and "could stand as a member of the Canadian Parliament if desired." At the same time the War Office had "requested" him to return to England. A little later Mr. Forster said he himself "had instructed Lord Dundonald to return home and not take any further part in political controversies." In plain English Lord Dundonald was dismissed by the Canadian Government and ordered home by the Imperial Government. There was a good deal of emphasis on both sides of the Atlantic. This could not have occurred had Lord Dundonald conducted himself with reasonable discretion.


