On the evening of February 4th, Charles B. Hutchinson, a man about fifty years of age connected with the Duke of Buccleuch's Dalkieth estate office gave a dinner for sixteen friends at the end of which coffee was served first to the ladies, and later to the gentlemen. After only a few minutes several ladies became ill, and then a number of the gentlemen complained of distress. Physicians were summoned but the host died during the night. Later Alexander Clapperton, a relative died.

Twelve others were more or less seriously ill for some days. Post mortem examinations revealed that the deaths were due to poisoning, and suspicion fell on the son John. A warrant for his arrest was issued, and today the officers found him at a hotel at Guernsey. An exciting scene followed during which the young man drew a vial from his pockets and despite the efforts of the officers to prevent him, drank the contents. He died in a few moments.

The motive for poisoning the dinner party if known has not been divulged.

FRENCH NEWSPAPERS FLAYED BY ARCHBISHOP

QUEBEC, Feb. 20.—A pastoral letter from Archbishop Begin was read yesterday in all the Roman Catholic Churches of the Diocese. The letter denounces La Vie and Le Soleil, stating that a Catholic journalist, whether he be swayed by party or not, should put the cause of God and the Church above all, and should never sacrifice the superior principles of Catholic doctrine, morality and discipline to human ambition.

After quoting the opinion of Pius X, the letter continues that papers which carry on a campaign against the clergy should be denounced the letter points out that the two papers took an incorrect attitude on the question of religious education. The letter then points out that four years ago L'Action Sociale was founded by the clergy to fulfill the desire of Pius X that journals should be founded in all countries to defend the interests and works of the Church. The letter charges that La Vie from the beginning has sought to stir up prejudices against La Action Sociale.

On the other hand Le Soleil has broken a long silence to direct unjust and unnecessary attacks against the organization of the clergy. The letter denounces the action as unworthy of the attitude of Catholic writers. The letter concludes by stating that the Archbishop testifies with satisfaction to the work done by L'Action Sociale.

MACON DENOUNCES PEARY AS FAKIR

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Representative Macon, of Arkansas, speaking in general debate on the naval appropriation bill in the house last night, made a sensational attack on Capt. Robert E. Peary, denouncing him as a "fakir," and declaring that he "should be driven from the naval service."

The bitter words used by the member from Arkansas were quickly answered by Peary's friends. Representative J. Hampton Moore of Pennsylvania, after vainly attempting to interrupt Mr. Macon finally got the floor in his own right. He characterized Mr. Macon's speech as "unjust, outrageous and offensive."

He said there was always some one to be found to suspect every achievement by men of genius and courage. He referred to Capt. Hobbes's exploit of the Merrimack and to Dewey's victory at Manila bay.

"Heroes like these," said Mr. Moore, "have not the time to stop and deal with every dog that barks at their heels."

Mr. Macon who evoked a roar of laughter in the house several days ago by announcing that in using the language, "wilful and deliberate liar, dirty little pilferer or words and contemptible little ass," he had gone about as far as his "fellowship with the Methodists permitted," added some original phrases to the history of debates in the house last night.

He said that Peary's whole story was "a fake, pure and simple." He said his contempt for "fake heroes" was supreme, and he intimated that he put "the hero of San Juan hill" in that class. Mr. Macon denounced the Peary Arctic Club and charged that it maintained a paid lobby in Washington. He said that President Taft's judgment in this matter was not to be accepted, for he congratulated Cook as heartily as he did Peary.

Paying his compliments to the editors of the New York Times and the New York Post, Mr. Macon characterized them as "unblinking know-all fit-bits" and "pea-eyed, pin-headed and putrid-tongued infinitesimals."

He referred to Peary as a "fur-trader," pictured him as "a self-aggrandized, self-opinionated, puffed-up near-hero," and finally denounced him as "an unfaithful servant and an idle loafer, who might as well be driven to the service instead of being promoted."

"I pity," he continued, "an who is so ignorant as to be terror-stricken all the time for fear he will be called ignorant by some saphead, or so cowardly that he is afraid to think his own thoughts for fear some great editor will find out what he is thinking about and adversely criticize him therefor."

Mr. Macon expressed his belief that Peary and Cook on one of the trips to the north when they were companions, figured out that it would be easy to "fake" a discovery. He said that he started out at the same time to claim the discovery. He said that instead of being awarded with promotion to the rank of rear-admiral, as President Taft and the committee on naval affairs have recommended, Peary's feat was, at best, worthy only of a medal like those awarded to marathon runners.

Mr. Macon spoke an hour and forty minutes. When Mr. Moore arose to reply, he said he desired to get into the record a few things in answer to "a most unjust and outrageous assault."

Mr. Moore said he had great respect for newspapers and newsmen, but he noted with pride that the press gallery remained empty throughout the time the representative from Arkansas had the floor.

"I am glad to know," said Mr. Moore, "that no one in that gallery was willing to sit there and listen to the diatribes of the gentleman from Arkansas, offensive as they were, up one of the great men of his country; or to listen to the violent epithets he applied to newspaper editors."

Mr. Moore proceeded to glowingly praise Peary. He said he resented the terms "fakir" and "loafer" applied to Peary by Mr. Macon, driven from the floor. Mr. Moore had read and put into the Record a letter from Rear-Admiral Chester, who passed upon Peary's proofs, in which he explained his rapid travel when alone.

SHEFFIELD CHOIR IS COMING TO CANADA

LONDON, Feb. 20.—Dr. Coward's Sheffield Choir, which is undertaking a tour of the Empire under the direction of Dr. Charles Harris, sails from Liverpool on March 17. The full programme issued last night shows that Sir Edward Elgar will share the duties of conductor with Dr. Coward when in Canada and the United States. Dr. Harris also assisted. The principals definitely engaged are Miss Jenny Taggart, Miss Maud Wilby, and Lady Nora Noel, soprano, Miss Gertrude Lonsdale, and Miss Alice Healey, contraltos, Henry Turpin and Wilfrid Virgo, tenors, and Robert Charlesworth and Robert Chignell, basses. The distance covered will be between 30,000 and 40,000 miles. The programme is very comprehensive, including all varieties in part-songs and madrigals. Empire music, "The Dream of Gerontius," "The Kingdom," "Elijah," "The Messiah," "The Golden Legend," "Best Pair of Sirens," Dr. Harris's "Pan," Bach's "Sing Ye."

During March, April, and until May 18 the choir will be in Canada and the United States. All June and July will be spent in Australia and New Zealand. On August 3 the choir sails from Perth for South Africa, and from 21 to 31 Durban, Pietermaritzburg, Pretoria, and Johannesburg will engage attention. The first nine days of September will be devoted to concerts in Pretoria, Bloemfontein, Kimberly, and Capetown, and on the 10th the party will start for home, arriving in London on September 30. The Earl of Minto, Earl Grey, the Earl of Dudley, Lord Ilington, and Lord Gladstone are the presidents.
