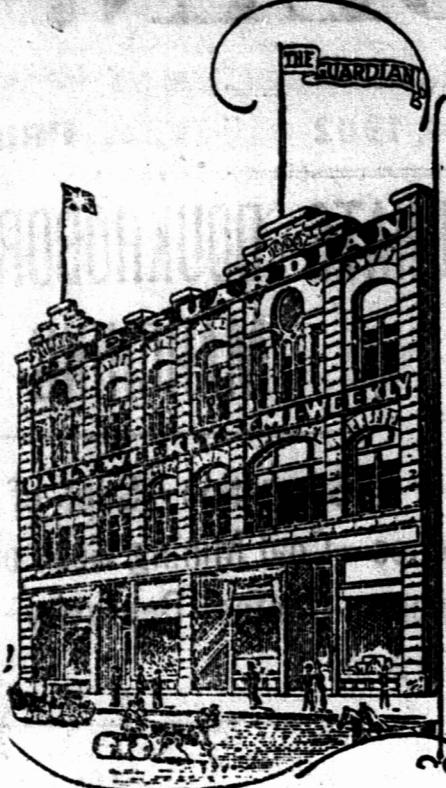

a dollar in it? No, not a dollar." And yet it was Island people, the Messrs. Rattenbury, to wit, who did put thousands of dollars into the pork-packing industry. I was the Government who "would not put a dollar into it," so long as it was in the hands of Island men, but stand ready with their guarantee of \$153,000 for the first outsiders that care to come along!

Again The Pioneer, when asked why the guarantee of bonds is to be given to this enterprise and refused to a condensed milk, boot and shoe, or furniture industry, replies: "Because we hope that no person or company about to organize such industries—desirable as they no doubt might be—could be found with 'gall' enough to ask for a Government guarantee or other Government aid!" We doubt not that the company of outsiders may have more "gall" than a company made up of our own people, but is "gall" a sufficient reason for pledging the credit of the Province and exposing our people to the further danger of monopoly and oppression? Let our people beware lest a contract based upon or granted because of the "gall" of the promoters, be found bitter as gall and wormwood in its results—a galling monopoly created and the bitterness of increased burdens added thereto.

THE PIONEER AGAIN.

The Pioneer in an article whose barren, wearisome, and needless length may serve to recall Israel's forty years' wanderings in the wilderness, attempts to reply to The Guardian on the pork-packing question. At the very outset it assumes that no agreement has been entered into between the Government and the Company. We quote:

"The Guardian has been told repeatedly that no agreement has been made with the Dominion Packing Co., yet it harps on this string continuously."
 No agreement, forsooth! If there is no agreement then what did Premier Peters mean when he referred to such agreement or contract half a dozen times in his speech at the Board of Trade meeting in this city? Here are a few of his remarks quoted from the official verbatim report:
 "There are some details of the contract which the Government cannot disclose until the whole is completed."
 "But the Government are not bound to disclose every detail of the contract until the whole matter is closed up."
 "The Company approached them when they were busy with other matters."
 "They did not enter into this contract for political gain."
 "We came to certain conclusions, made certain arrangements, and then made an Order in Council accepting the proposals."
 "If we are convinced that the contract is a good one we should carry it out."
 "And if the company do not perform their part of the contract as agreed upon it falls to the ground."
 "No loss can possibly accrue to this Province on account of this contract."
 We submit that if the great hog question is to be fairly and intelligently discussed by the promoters in a manner that shall commend itself to the country, the Government organs shall say the same things as the Leader or the Government. "Contract agreed upon," "Order in Council accepting the proposals," says the Premier. "No agreement has been made," says the Pioneer. We presume that Premier Peters knows what he is talking about, and if he does, the Pioneer is simply making itself ridiculous. Even among hogs the suckling may not presume to disagree with the father of the herd without incurring the danger of being driven from the feed-trough. The Pioneer should take warning lest peradventure its rations be shortened.

We need not follow The Pioneer through its weary columns of tedious argument based upon false premises and leading on to forced and irrational conclusions. "Hail our people faith" in the pork-packing enterprise? It asks. And it answers, "Yes, unbounded faith. Would they pay

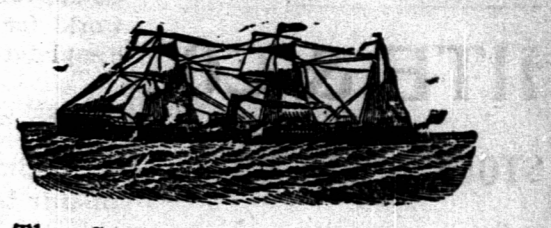
