### FAST LINE AND SUBSIDIES.

A cable despatch announces that it is understood that Mr. Chamberlain is co-operating with the Canadian Ministers in London, to induce the Imperial Cabinet to assist the projected fast line to one half the extent of subsidy which Canada may agree to give. Mr. Chamberlain has probably a larger general interest in the colonies than any of his colleagues and may not be able to bring them to his way of thinking. Still the time is propitious for securing an Imperial subsidy owing to the scare created by the Morgan combine and a sum may now be granted which would not have been considered for a moment a year ago.

Behind this lies the question of what would be a fair proportion for the Mother Country and the Dominion, each to pay for a service such as is contemplated. It may be readily admitted that Canada would be the principal beneficiary, but it is clearly in the interest of Britain also to prevent the establishment of an unopposed shipping monopoly more or less hostile to her interests on the Atlantic. None the less very strong opposition would be probably aroused in England, over a proposal to subsidise an Anglo-Canadian line to the extent of half a million dollars a year, even if Canada should consent to give a round million yearly for the same object. British trade spreads in every direction and the people of Britain are more chary of giving steamship subsidies than are the people of Canada.

There are many things yet to be settled before an Anglo-Canadian fast line can be put in operation. It will be difficult to decide between the powerful interests that are competing for the contract. These are understood to be the Canadian Pacific Railway Company on the one hand, and a combination made up of the Furness, Allan and Elder-Dempster lines on the other. Then there is the question as to the rate of speed, upon which the cost of the service and the amount of subsidy must so largely depend. For our own part we think that half measures can only result in failure. We must have a line of steamers equal to the fastest and best if we are to compete successfully against the Morgan combination. And after all these preliminaries are decided the ships must be contracted for and built. All of which will take time.

### THE CROWNING OF THE KING.

The ceremony of crowning a British Sovereign is both religious and political. It includes the anointing of his person in a solemn and ceremonious way; the investing with certain garments, forming a consecrated dress; the bestowal of a scepter, sword and orb, and the placing of a crown upon the head. At earlier periods in the history of Europe coronation was

held to be essential to entrance upon kingly dignity and power, but this is not true of the present time, especially where the succession is indisputable, as in the case of King Edward. He has been as really and legally the Sovereign of the Empire from the date of Queen Victoria's death as he will be hereafter.

As a matter of fact neither of the last three German Emperors had a formal coronation. In recent reigns in Great Britain the ceremony of coronation has followed at a considerable interval after the Sovereign's accession to the throne. In the case of the late Queen Victoria, she began to reign June 20, 1837, on the death of her uncle William IV, and her coronation took place in Westminster Abbey, June 28, 1838, more than a year later. King Edward acceded to the throne on the death of the late Queen January 22, 1901. The date first fixed for his coronation was 26th June, 1902, but owing to His Majesty's illness was postponed till today, August 9, being over a year and six months after he ascended the throne.

Both the King and Queen will be solemnly crowned today, but in very different fashion, the Queen being thus officially recognised as the consort of the King and not as a reigning sovereign. Both are now somewhat advanced in life, the King being in his sixty-first, and the Queen in her fifty-eighth year. Most heartily will the readers of The Guardian and the loyal people of this city and Island join in wishing them a long, happy and prosperous reign.

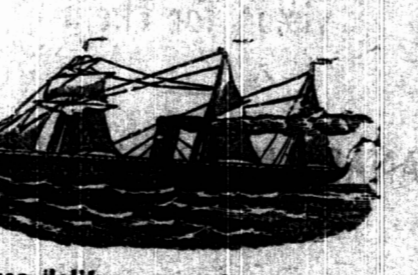
