## Army Team Scores 4-1 Victory Over College Squad

An Army team last night defeated a P.W.C. squad 4-1 in the opening game of the second section of the City Hockey League schedule, played at the Forum. The victory puts Army in first place. About 400 were in attendance.

 by the Germans, with artillery of both sides spraying shells into its rubble streets. Civilians said the town was all but deserted.

French troops made local advances in the hills north of Casale, and American artillery fire repulsed two German counter-attacks Sunday night, headquarters said.

In the lower Casagliano valley near the Mediterranean coast, British forces made shore advances, captured Mount Natisse, northwest of Minturno, and Mount Purgatorio, northeast of Casale.

Near the Adriatic Canadian troops of the British 8th army attacked in the direction of Tolio, supported by tanks and artillery. Allied headquarters said they met stiff resistance.

British and United States bombers and fighters continued their annihilating assaults against the Japanese in Penang, the second torpeding of a company ship in a Caribbean harbor. At Penang he had to effect repairs and get underway after the ship had suffered fifty holes from shrapnel and was taking water. **To Increase Treatment Allowances**

**Special Diets Tax Ingenuity Of Dietitians**

OTTAWA, Feb. 1—(CP)—The Federal Government has decided to increase treatment allowances to servicemen and servicewomen discharged for medical reasons and allowances paid to veterans of the First Great War under the Veterans Allowance Act, Pension Minister Mackenzie announced today.

Mr. Mackenzie, at a press conference in his office on Parliament Hill, said that in future the treatment allowances will be equal to regular pay of rank held, up to the former pay of rank held, plus the regular scale of dependents' allowances.

Previously when a man was discharged for medical reasons he immediately went on treatment allowances which provided—no matter what his rank—\$44.20 monthly for himself, \$18.20 for his wife, \$12 monthly for each of the first and second children, \$10 monthly for the third child and \$8 monthly for each of the fourth, fifth and sixth children.

The change means that a private who formerly received \$46 a month now will receive \$46. A private's wife who formerly received \$18.20 now will get \$18.20. A lieutenant who formerly received \$44.20 now will get \$44.20. A lieutenant's wife who formerly received \$18.20 now will get \$18.20. In addition, the dependents will also be paid the cost-of-living bonus they now are receiving. Allowances for children remain unchanged.

The maximum treatment allowance will not exceed 80 per cent of a sub-lieutenant in the navy, a lieutenant in the army or a flying officer in the air force.

Those qualifying for the increased allowances are those whose treatment is continued without interruption from the date of discharge—either as in-patients, or in certain cases as out-patients. The allowances may be continued only for a period equal to that of service during the present war, or for 12 months following discharge, whichever is the lesser.

Provision is made also for dependents' allowances for persons who become dependents of the ex-serviceman after the date of discharge.

The increases provided under an amendment to the war veterans act will be paid to those up to \$365 a year may be paid to an unmarried veteran, or to the widow of a veteran, or to dependent children, and \$700 may be paid to a married veteran or the widow of a veteran with dependent children.

Now the allowances may have casual earnings up to \$125 annually and an additional unearned income of \$250 annually.

Now the allowances may be paid without taking into account certain other income sources, such as interest, dividends, or municipal relief money, or mother's allowance paid on account of dependent children.

Mr. Mackenzie said the increases will benefit veterans of the First Great War who are destitute and unable to work, but whose physical condition is not due to war service and if there is no other source of income they are therefore not eligible for pension. Pensioners and their widows in receipt of small pensions due to war disabilities also will benefit, he said.

**Says Nazis Destroy Italian Treasures**

LONDON, Feb. 1—(CP)—Reuters—New and deliberate destruction of Italian art treasures by German troops was revealed today following the return to London from Italy of Sir Charles Leonard Woolley, archaeologist.

At the same time fresh Allied plans to safeguard Italian art treasures were announced by Sir James Grigg, war secretary. The plans were drawn up by Sir Charles Leonard Woolley, who was sent to Italy for the purpose.

Sir James in official statements disclosed how the Germans discovered and destroyed ancient mosaic and ceramic documents dating from the time of the Roman Empire. He said that the Nazis had hidden them for safety.

Between 60 and 70 paintings were lost, including an early portrait of Botticelli and the Madonna and Child by Luiti.

Sir James Grigg said this was the second time the Nazis had openly known of deliberate and organized destruction of Italian

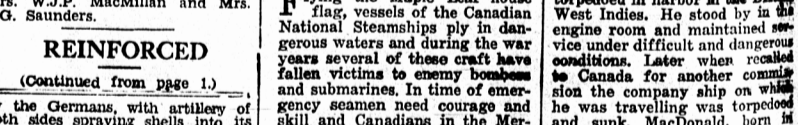
**Suggests Stassen For Presidency**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1—(AP)—Senator Joseph Ball (Rep-Minn.) called on Republicans tonight to draft Harold E. Stassen, former governor of Minnesota, as the vice-presidential candidate in the presidential campaign. He said the party needs and the United States ought to elect.

In a broadcast generally regarded as opening a national campaign, Ball pictured Stassen—now a lieutenant commander on duty with the United States Navy—as the best man for the job. He said Stassen "will face the toughest job in our history," Ball told his listeners in the course of a prepared address.

"There is no place in this process for bitterness and name calling, or for movements based wholly on an 'anti' or 'stop' philosophy," he said.
