Old Gag Just Fails To Come Off

CHICAGO, Aug. 21.—(AP)—That old gag about the jockey carrying his horse across the finish line just failed to come off at Washington Park today.

The John Bullman Handicap, at 3 3/8 miles, sent five claiming races around the Washington Park oval exactly three times in the event, believed to have been the first at this specific distance ever held in the United States.

The letters had a grand time, but the same couldn't be said of the horse. Two of which were panned so hard at the finish that their jockeys immediately dismounted and gave them a helpful low back as the judges stand. Winning Mark won by 15 lengths.

Jane Azoff Wins Free-for-all In Straight Heats At Amherst Meet

AMHERST, N. S., Aug. 21.—(CP)—The former Grand Circuit mare, Jane Azoff, owned in Murray River P.E.I., headed the field today in the Free-for-All of a harness meet staged here. The Azoff horse was chased to the wire in each heat by Aaron L. of Charlottetown and her first mile in 2:10 was the best of the day.

In the Named Race a New Brunswick horse, Bedford Grattan from Wickham, won the event after racing four heats. Hal Britton of New Glasgow, N. S., and Barney Hanover of Charlottetown, each shared a first with Bedford Grattan in the first three miles but the New Brunswick horse found the stamina to win the extra heat. His opening mile in 2:10 3/4 was the second best time of the meet.

Another Prince Edward Island horse, Uscita Britton of Kensington, won the 2:23 Trot and Pace. The Britton horse dropped the first heat to Major Bowes of Charlottetown but made a strong enough bid to take the next two.

A year ago four pitchers from each major league achieved this feat—Bob Feller of Cleveland, Red Ruffing of the New York Yankees, Dutch Leonard of Washington, and Buck Newsom of Detroit in the American League and Curt Davis of the St. Louis Cardinals, Luke Hamlin of Brooklyn, and Bucky Walters and Paul Derringer of Cincinnati in the National.

This season only five tossers appear fairly sure of hitting the 20-pipe figure, unless others put on a late stretch spurt. Current pace-setters are Cleveland's Feller with 20 and six, Al Milnar with 14 and seven, Detroit's Newsom with 14 and two, Cincinnati's Derringer with 16 and nine, and Walters with 16 won and eight lost.

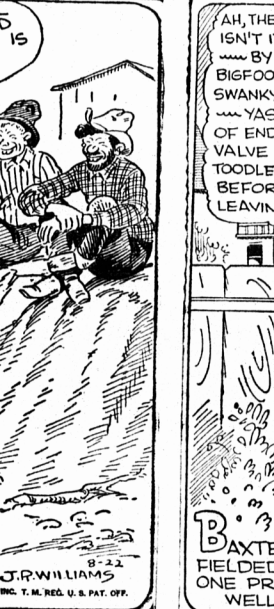

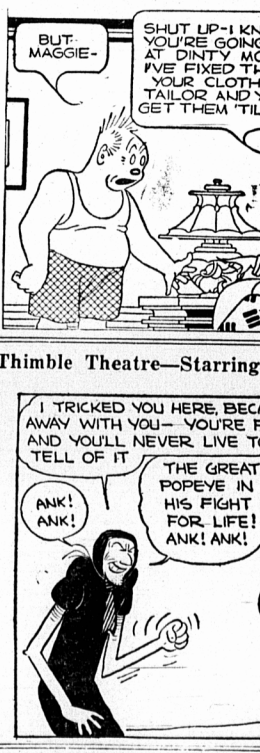
