Harry Dunn who has been visiting his parents in Gaspereaux has returned to Charlottetown where he will resume his studies in the St. Dunstan's College.

The maritime provinces will be represented at the Imperial Council of the Mystic Shriners, which meets at New Orleans, by Dr. J. R. McIntosh, of Halifax, who left last evening; Daniel Morrison, of Truro, and Station Agent J. L. Thompson, of Charlottetown.

The gathering constitutes the supreme body for North America and the annual gathering is an event of great importance to the city in which it meets on account of the festivities which always mark the gathering. Another representative from the maritime provinces will attend in the person of Dr. Thos. Trenaman, of Halifax, who qualifies as Past Grand Master of Karnac Temple, Montreal. For some time past the Nova Scotia members have been anxious to have a temple of their own and it is the intention to have the matter taken up at New Orleans, if possible. At present Luxor Temple has jurisdiction over all the maritime provinces and Newfoundland, and members in the farther districts find it almost impossible to attend the meetings. As under the rules, each state of the American union is entitled to a separate temple, the Nova Scotia members claim that each province should have the same privilege.

A committee from the foregoing teams was appointed to draw up a constitution, bye-laws and rules for senior and junior leagues, said committee to report to a general meeting to be held on Wednesday evening, 13th, instant, at 7.30, when applications from other teams will be received. From present indications there will be lively times this summer in baseball circles.

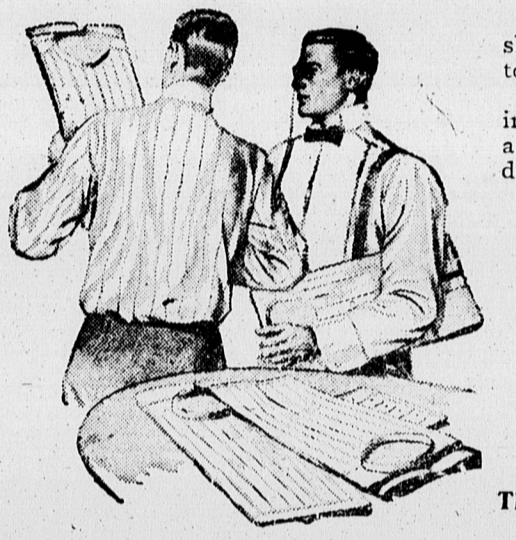

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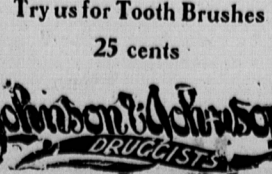
