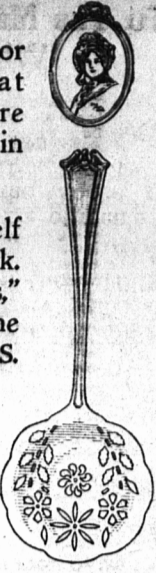

This is only another example of the bravery so often displayed by our fishermen in saving lives during the fishing season.
