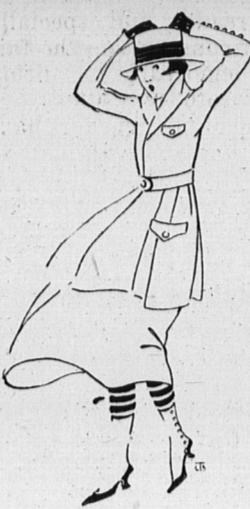

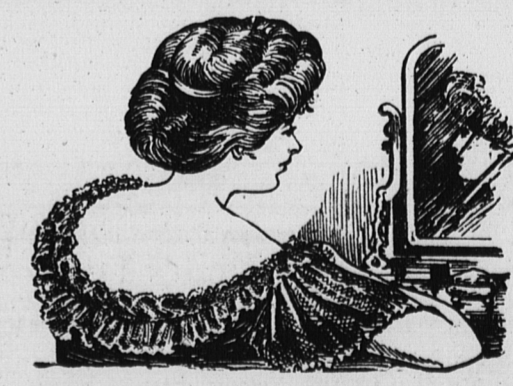

Pte. Vernon H. McKie, formerly of Bay Fortune Killed in Action

Pte. Vernon H. McKie, the second son of his widowed mother who resides at 1508 Third Street, N. W., was killed in action. This sad news was received from Ottawa this morning and has come as a great shock to the bereaved mother. The late gallant soldier who has laid down his life in the great struggle for supremacy of right was only 25 years of age and enlisted in that battalion which was recruited by Lieut.-Col. Robinson, signing up among the Medicine Hat men that joined that unit. Later he was transferred to that battalion commanded by Lieut.-Col. Bell, and he fell mortally wounded while serving under this old war veteran. By trade he was a carpenter and he and his mother and sister came to Calgary about 6 years ago from Fortune, P. E. I. Although he was of a very quiet disposition he made a number of friends while in this city especially among the congregation of the North Hill Presbyterian church which he and his mother and sister attended.—Calgary Herald, July 27.
Note:—Pte. McKie above referred to was a son of the late Mr. John McKie, Bay Fortune. Another son, Alden W. McKie is serving with the Canadian Engineers in France and has been at the front for over two years. Pte. Vernon is the first of the Bay Fortune boys to make the supreme sacrifice and many friends of the family will deeply sympathize with his widowed mother, now in Calgary, in her great sorrow.
