

# THERE WILL BE PLENTY OF COAL TO SUPPLY MARITIME PROVINCES.

### Alexander Dick Says That There is no Cause For Alarm. Coal Company Not Trying to Take an Unfair Advantage of the Public. The Statement of Mayor Howland Denied.

SYDNEY, Oct. 12.—Alexander Dick, general sales agent of the Dominion Coal Company, returned last evening from New York and Montreal. Mr. Dick gave out the following statement:

As far as the Dominion Coal Company is concerned, the statements that are telegraphed from the upper provinces to the effect that we are discriminating against the Canadian public are absolutely untrue. These reports have had a disturbing influence in the maritime provinces, with the result that people have become anxious regarding their winter's coal supply, and consequently are rushing in orders at this time, which is most inconvenient for us. We wish to ship every ton of coal we possibly can to Montreal before the close of navigation in order that the supply there and further west may be assured. After that there

will be plenty of coal to supply the requirements of the maritime provinces, and there is therefore no cause for alarm. Navigation in the St. Lawrence usually closes about November 15th.

We are not seeking to take any unfair advantage of the public, and of course the preference is given here, as elsewhere, to the old friends and customers of the company. The reports of large shipments to the States are not well founded, and later the company expected to be in a position to do something more for the Canadian market in case of a prolongation of the strike.

Mr. Shields has already denied the statements of Mayor Howland, of Toronto and his hasty action in passing resolution was probably based on erroneous information.

Mr. Dick believes the big strike in the United States will be over in two weeks.

The strike was caused by the company refusing to comply with the skimmer rule. One thousand are affected.

If parents, teachers, editors and pastors advocated judicious frugality as an offset to needless and often unwise expenditure, much of the suffering of those on the down hill side of life might be avoided and much of the evil resulting from the waste of money prevented.
