NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—Some half a dozen stocks were weak in the morning, earnings available for dividends and a few rails. B & O went up on a weakness over dividends prospects, later in the day attempts were made to rally the market with Can Steel and BKO prominent. The tobacco stocks were also strong led by American Tobacco, toward the close the rally dwindled and final prices were irregular and off from their high. Turnover was small, likewise outside interest, call money was 2 p.c. all day. Total sales 1,333,300.

## Late Market News

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 22.—The inquiry for all lines of cash grain was moderate here today and the undertone to the market was firm. Owing to continued light arrivals potatoes were advanced 5 to 10 cents per 80 pounds bag for new locally grown stock. They are now selling at 90 to 81. The butter market continued easy and prices were fractionally lower. Eastern townships number 1 pasteurized creamery sold at 29 1/2 cents per pound in cartons. To retailers solids sold at 31 cents and prints at 32 cents per pound. Receipts were 2150 boxes. Trading in cheese continued at a low ebb and values were easy. Quebec colored was quoted at 14 1/2 cents, while white was available at 14 1/2 cents per pound. Ontario cheese was 15 1/2 to 15 3/4 cents per pound. Receipts were 5451 boxes. The egg market was unchanged. Specials sold at 42 to 43 cents. Fresh extras 32 3/8 to 39 cents; fresh firsts at 33 to 34 cents, and fresh at 33 to 34 cents, and fresh seconds at 29 to 30 cents per dozen. Receipts were 1632 cases.

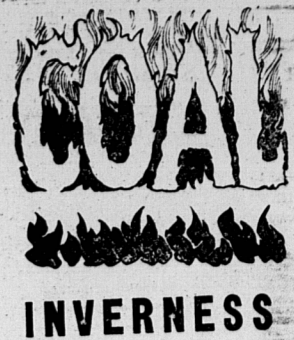
