





GHANDI LOOKED ON AS INDIA'S MARTYR

BOSTON, Aug. 27.—Disturbances of all kinds are increasing in India due to the Ghandi movement these missionaries and merchants returning from the far East declared Monday upon their arrival upon the British Steamship City of Lahore.
Conditions are causing the Government officials much anxiety the missionaries said, Miss Mary E. Gooch, a Methodist school teacher in Central India, returning to her home in Belleville, Ill., declared:
"Attendance at the native and mission schools have been cut 30 to 35 percent, because of the Ghandi propaganda."
"Servants once respectful, are today not even civil to their employers. Should Ghandi die in jail his death would greatly increase the menace of the present situation. The masses who have listened to and accepted his teachings would laud him as India's martyr. Almost anything in the nature of disturbance might be expected."
