Rankine Wins Marathon

TORONTO, May 24—Bob Rankine of Preston, Ont., veteran Canadian Olympic star, won the Dominion marathon championship today, covering a course laid between Oakville and Toronto in two hours, 36 minutes and 11 seconds.

Fred Bristol, Toronto runner, placed second, 300 yards behind the winner. Gerard Cote of St. Hyacinthe, Que., was third while the defending champion, Walter Young, of Verdun, Que., was fifth behind Duncan McCallum, steady Toronto star.

Of the field of 22 which started, 17 finished the regulation Olympic distance of 26 miles, 385 yards. It is expected the winner will be chosen to represent Canada next year at the Olympics in Finland.

Cef Garcia and Popeye Woods meet in Madison Square Garden two weeks after the Baer-Nova go. Then Louis-Galento June 28 in Yankee Stadium. Two weeks later Billy Conn meets Melio Bettina in the Garden for the lightweight weight crown. Fred Apostoli and Solly Krieser huddle for the middleweight bauble after that and in September Uncle Mike brings together the Baer-Nova winner and Louis-Galento victor.

Jacobs cares no more for his contract on John Henry Lewis since the negro lightweight champ has been found to be almost blind in one eye. He regards Bettina as the crown wearer and for practical purposes it is better to be recognized as champion by Mike Jacobs than all the boxing commissions there are.

Now that Colonel Jake Ruppert is gone and Ed Barrow is at the helm of New York Yankees, the Bronx Bombers, once called the Ruppert Rifles, are monickered the Barrow Busters. And "Di-Maggio Line" is another name for the Yanks heavy hitters. More and more words are being written on the old argument whether to break up the Yankees for the good of the American League or not. To which Ed Barrow repeats: "The Yanks won't knock themselves on the chin just to be accommodating."

DODGERS SUFFER SIXTH DEFEAT; GIANTS SHUT OUT BY CINCINNATI

NEW YORK, May 24—Basting Vito Tambo out of the box with a four run flurry in the sixth inning, Pittsburgh Pirates stopped Brooklyn 6-3 today for the Dodgers' sixth successive National League baseball defeat.

Joe Bowman went the route for the Pirates on nine hits, of which seven came in the last four innings after Pittsburgh moved out in front.

Claude Passeau limited Chicago Cubs to seven hits and struck out eight, but Philadelphia Phillies went down to a 3-2 defeat their seventh in a row in the National League baseball race.

Although Larry French gave up 11 hits, the veteran left-hander was able to win his third successive victory of the season. French suffered only one bad inning, the seventh, when the Quakers landed on him for five singles in a row.

Paul Derringer shut out New York Giants on five hits as Cincinnati Reds slugged their way to their ninth consecutive victory 6-0.

Starting with two runs on three hits in the first inning, the Reds punched at the offerings of Harry Gumbert until they brought about his removal by a three run spurge in the fifth.

Curt Davis gave another examination of the brilliant pitching that has sent St. Louis Cardinals to the top of the league and has kept them there ahead of the charging second-place Reds.

Davis blanked Boston Bees 7-0 for his sixth victory of the season and his second shutout. It was the Cards' sixth straight win and their eighth in the last 14 games.

Davis pitched only day before yesterday, coming to the rescue of Merton Cooper in the ninth inning and turning back three men in a row to save a 2-1 victory over Philadelphia. In the last six games, Cardinal pitchers have allowed only six runs and 39 hits.

Roy Oliver Wins Road Race

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., May 24—Roy Oliver of New Glasgow won the 20th annual May 24 road race here today, leading a field of 15 over the 5,000-metre course in 32:46 minutes. John Paul, Indian from Springhill, N. S., placed second, and third went to the veteran Jimmy Haw from nearby Westville.

Blue Peter Is Winner Of Epsom Derby

EPSOM, England, May 24—A family tradition was maintained for the Earl of Rosbery, today when his 60th Blue Peter swept over the rising ground from Tattenham Corner to win the 165th running of the Derby with a great closing drive which disclosed stamina and staying power his critics said he lacked.

The handsome son of Fairway out of rancy Free played a waiting game until he reached Tattenham Corner, the sharp curve of which is the traditional graveyard of Derby hopes. Then, emerging from a jam, he took the lead and ran on to finish handily four lengths ahead of Edward Edmond's Fox Cub. Another three lengths behind was the Earl of Derby's Heliopolis.

First favorite to win since 1935, Blue Peter returned at the rate of 7 to 2 the thousands of pounds wagered on him by the throngs of rich and poor who crowded the rolling downs to watch the great carnival of the English turf. The bookies, however, took a beating. One estimate was that they lost \$5,000,000 to those in the 500,000 crowd who backed Blue Peter.

As for Lord Rosbery, he said he was a happy man to be able to carry on a tradition of his house. His father, a prime minister of Great Britain in Queen Victoria's days, won the classic three times; his maternal grandfather, Baron Rothschild, won with Favonius in 1871.

Blue Peter, running with 26 rivals in the largest derby field since 1922, covered the 1 1/2 mile course in two minutes, 36 4/5 seconds, three seconds slower than the record set by the Aga Khan's Mahmoud three years ago.

The winning jockey was Ephraim Smith, who scored his first triumph in the race. The trainer was Jack Jarvis, who had been confident he would achieve the life's ambition to win the Derby after Blue Peter's victory in the first of the turf's classics, the Two Thousand Guineas.

Once again the Derby eluded Gordon Richards, for years the champion jockey of the turf. He was aboard Fox Cub.

With the King and Queen in Canada, and Queen Mary kept in London following yesterday's automobile accident, the royal family were represented by the Dukes and Duchesses of Gloucester and Kent.

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Royals Defeat Buffalo Bisons In Doubleheader

MONTRÉAL, May 24—Montreal Royals defeated Buffalo Bisons 2-1 in both ends of a doubleheader today, making a clean sweep of the International Baseball League series curtailed to two games by rain.

A crowd of 7,000 watched Marvin Duke take a pitching duel from Ken Ash in the opener for his third win of the campaign, and then saw Bob Porter, Montreal's ace righthander, record his seventh victory of the season against two defeats by twirling three-hit, shutout ball in the nightcap.

Earl Caldwell pitched his third consecutive victory by 1-0 score and gave Toronto Maple Leafs an even split on a doubleheader with Rochester Red Wings. The Wings hammered two Toronto pitchers freely to win the opener 4-2.

Billy Schuster, first man up in the eighth inning of the scheduled seven-inning afterpiece clouted one of Roy Henshaw's offerings over the left field fence for the only run of the game as Caldwell extended his string of runless innings to 22 in a row.

A pinch single by Glen Stewart, reserve infielder, scored Tom Hatsey from second base in the ninth inning to give Jersey City Giants a 5-4 victory over Syracuse Chiefs.
