IN Memoriam

MRS. DOUGLAS TURNER

Word has been received in this city by Mrs. Kelsey J. Burhoe, of the death of her aunt, Mrs. Turner, who died at her home on Monday, Feb. 22, 1938.

The following has been taken from the *Halifax Advance*:
 Death Wednesday morning called another of the early San Diego county pioneers when Mrs. Douglas Jenkins Turner passed away at her home on Monterey street.

A resident of San Benito county since 1870, Mrs. Turner was in her 94th year at the time of her death. Active and in good health considering her advanced years, she fell at her home on Monday and shock and complications resulted in her death.

With her husband, the late E. J. Turner, she moved to San Felipe section from Boston in 1870, settling on the Turner ranch which had been previously acquired by her husband. She was the last surviving member of the early pioneers who settled in the San Felipe district in 1870.

Born in Prince Edward Island, Canada, she spent her girlhood in Maine and her young womanhood in California. She came to this city when she met the late E. J. Turner, marrying him in 1870, leaving immediately for their ranch in this county.

She resided on the ranch until 1918 when she moved to Halifax. An active member of the M. E. Church since childhood, Mrs. Turner was known as a kindly Christian woman, always ready to extend a helping hand to those in less fortunate circumstances than herself. She remained active in church work until advanced years forced her to retire.

Surviving her are three sons, E. J. Turner, San Felipe rancher, A. G. Turner, also a rancher in the San Felipe section and a member of the board of supervisors of the San Benito county, and C. M. Turner, a member of the Larch Hardware Co., firm and mayor of the City of Hollister; one granddaughter, Miss Barbara Turner, of San Felipe, and a sister, Mrs. Catherine McEachern, of Prince Edward Island.

Two sisters and one brother passed away in the past four years, namely, Mrs. Weatherly, San Diego, Calif., and Weatherly, Millview, P. E. Island, and Franklin, Millview, P. E. Island.

The funeral is in charge of the Black-Cooper Company and will be held from the mortuary at 2.30 this afternoon. Burial will be made in the IOOF cemetery.

Rumanians Uphold King In Plebiscite

BUCHAREST, Feb. 24—(CP)—King Carol today submitted his new Fascist-style constitution to a national plebiscite and, according to early results of the voting, won an overwhelming vote of confidence from the Rumanian electorate.

Of the 106,000 registered voters in Bucharest, only 145 persons voted against the constitution, which would give Carol virtual dictatorship powers, while 9,900 abstained from voting.

When the polling booths closed at 5.30 o'clock tonight, more than 88 per cent of the 5,000,000 eligible citizens who were threatened with stiff penalties if they did not go to the polls had voted.

Those who opposed the constitution were believed to be members of the disbanded pro-Fascist Iron Guard and adherents of the extreme left parties.
