Here's a stunt for the golfers: W. E. McNamara professional at the Lahinch Golf Club, Clare Ireland, among other stunts drove a ball for 220 yards off the face of a woman's wrist watch without breaking the glass.

The thoroughbreds of Captain R. E. Sassoon, the famous millionaire sportsman who was fatally injured in a handicap steepchase at Lingfield, England, last month, were sold at Tattersalls Auction last week, the twenty horses bringing approximately \$43,000.

Clear Note, the horse whose split and roll caused the death of Capt. Sassoon, drew the attention of the crowd. He was actually seen to prick up his ears and then drop his head as if in mourning.

Last week I mentioned the death of R. H. Brett 2.03. This information was taken from a Western horse paper but was incorrect as Brett had been dead for three years.

A new starting device is being perfected by a Canadian named O'Leary. It runs in a metal groove which is fastened to the fence on each side of the track and is operated by a motor. When the horses are lined up in front of it the motor is started and the barrier just keeps in front of the horses to the starting point when it can be sprung.

Calumet Delco (2) 2.07 1-4 worlds champion two year old trotter over a half mile track is to race through the Bay State circuit this season. He was bought for a song at the New York auction the fall of 1931 and won 16 heats over half mile tracks last year in the average time of 2:12, and four over mile tracks averaging 2:09 1-8. He holds the world's record for a two year old over a half mile track, 2:07 1-4.

Bronx 2.02 3-4 by Belwin, who has lowered his record every year for several years, was shipped last week to Oslo, Norway, where he will do his future racing. He will be remembered as the horse that was cured as a non-scoring by being tied up and left on the track where he had thrown himself, for a few hours.

Harness racing will be held at the World's Grain Exhibition at Regina, July 24th to August 5th. Last year the Exhibition there had the runners, but they did not prove as interesting to the public so harness racing is being substituted.

The grandstand at the Vienna, Austria, race track, which was built twenty years ago, cost almost one million dollars. The Royal Boxes in the centre are lined with white marble and the hardware used is gold plated. Some class!

Speaking about Dr. Christopher and the horses he has owned, we may mention Baby Logan 2.15 1-2 afterwards sold to Dr. J. A. Johnston of Tignish, and Uscita 2.19 1-4. Our recollection of this good mare was the seven heat race which she won at the Charlottetown Driving Park track, Friday, September 30th, 1921. The event was a 2.19 class trot and had five starters. Miss

Belle Rico won the first heat in 2:17 1-4. The British Soldier the second heat in 2:18; Brenton H. the third heat in 2:19 1-2; Uscita the fourth and fifth heats in 2:19 1-4 and 2:23 1-4 with Brenton H. second both heats. The sixth heat was won by the British Soldier in 2:18 1-2 with Miss Belle Rico second. The race was carried over to the next afternoon when the British Soldier and Uscita raced off, Uscita winning handily in 2:21 1-2. It was one of the most interesting races that year. Brenton H. was driven by his owner-trainer the late H. C. Hooper. Miss Belle Rico by owner W. B. McArthur, the British Soldier by the late Ex-Mayor P. S. Brown and Uscita by Danny Steele.

The American Sportsman quoting the successful 2.10 trotters who won ten or more events in one season without meeting a defeat, says regarding Bill Sharen 2.04 1-4: "When a four year old he won his every start, seven in all, and during his second campaign over the half mile tracks in New Brunswick, Maine and Prince Edward Island, he disposed of all kinds of opposition and ran his string of victories up to twelve. Hence in two campaigns he escaped defeat and stood credited with nineteen victories."

"That there would be a determined effort to corral him for the Grand Circuit was to be expected and in due time the word went out that he was sold for \$25,000, and had joined the Murphy stable. In 1921 he never took the word, the story being that he was an ill-mannered horse in his stall and had met with an injury. The following year he appeared in a number of outstanding classics. He won three events, was second in five, third in two and unplaced once. His best race was the Transylvania, where he forced Peter the Brewer to his record of 2:02 1-2."

During his winning campaign in 1920 when Bill was credited with twelve victories over half mile tracks in the Maritimes and Maine, including the breaking of the track record at Charlottetown which he reduced to 2:11 1-4, and the winning of the Free-For-All at Woodstock from some of the best pacers in Maine, he was piloted in every race by the late Peter Carroll. We well remember the care and attention Peter gave his charge and the superb order and condition he displayed every time he appeared on the track. Although Bill was a bad horse he never attempted to act up with Peter, who had complete mastery over him. Not so when he went into Tommy Murphy's hands. The grooms and attendants appeared afraid of him. There are many who believe that had Peter Carroll continued to handle Bill in 1921 on the Grand Circuit, he would have taken a record close to two minutes and been the outstanding stake trotter in America. Just one roar from Peter was enough to put Bill Sharen in his place.

Speaking about the late Peter Carroll, we are sure that hundreds of our readers will remember him, so erect and masterful looking and will recall him on the track with his green cap and green driving coat. Peter was one of the most honorable and reliable drivers that ever sat behind a race horse. Every time he took the reins he drove to win and he had no peer in all Canada as a "catch" driver, that is to go up behind a strange horse on race day. Two or three scores and a few shouts from Peter and the horse would be on high and would give everything he had for the "old master."

How quickly the years pass by. It is not so long ago that we were thrilled by the achievements in the sulky of Ed Geers, or "Pop" Geers, as he was familiarly called. "Pop" was known as the "Silent Man from Tennessee," as he spoke seldom and then to the point. He was the exact opposite to Tommy Murphy in the sulky, sitting still in his drive to the wire, and no one yet knows how he got such surprising finishes out of his horses. Murphy on the other hand was all fire and action, sometimes literally hurling his horses across the finish line. Geers was one of the greatest horsemen the world has ever known and we recall among others that he has driven and marked the following trotters and pacers. The Harvester 2.01, Saint Frisco 2.01 1/2, Etawah 2.03, Dudy Archdale 2.03 1/2, The Abbott 2.03 1/2, Single G. 1.58 1/2, Napoleon Direct 1.59 1/2, Hal Mahone 2.01, Hedgewood Boy 2.01, Robert T. 2.01 1/2. A peculiarity of Geers was that he would not drive a hopped pacer.

Guy Aubrey 2.05 1/2, a son of Guy Axworthy from a Captain Aubrey 2.07 1/2 dam, won more races in two consecutive years than any trotter on the records, his total be-

PRODUCE

MONTEREAL, April 7.—A pinch in winter storage supplies pushed butter to new high levels on the Montreal produce and dairy market today. With local supplies light and demand good, butter advanced to the highest level since March 1932. Summer production is expected to start in a few weeks when supplies will be sufficient to meet the demand. Prices for carlots or less of no 1 regraded rose a cent a pound closing at 25 1/2 to 26 cents a pound. Offerings were only 144 boxes. Eggs were also higher a gain of half a cent being recorded. Carlots of fresh graded extras sold at 17 to 17 1/2 cents, firsts at 15 to 15 1/2 cents and seconds at 14 to 14 1/2 cents a dozen. Receipts were light only totaling 1,268 cases. Current Ontario colored cheese held firm at 10 1/2 to 11 cents a pound. Receipts were 51 boxes. Potatoes remained steady at 65 to 70 cents for New Brunswick or Prince Edward Island green mountains per 80 pound bag and at 75 to 80 cents for Prince Edward Island green mountains per 80 pound bag.
