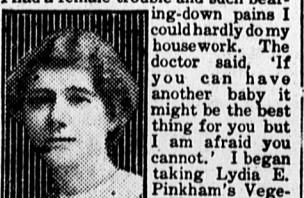

TORONTO, May 21—Fire losses in Canada during the week ending May 12th are estimated by The Monetary Times at \$939,000 compared with \$377,700 the previous week. The heaviest loss \$300,000 caused by a fire in the town of Maxville, Ontario.

Briand Opposes Council Meeting

PARIS, May 21—Premier Briand, of France, is opposed to a meeting of the supreme allied council to discuss the Silesian question until the inter-allied commission in Silesia has reported an agreement and submitted a report.

Some of this morning's newspapers declared that Mr. Briand and Prime Minister Lloyd George were likely to meet at Boulogne either to-morrow or Sunday.

It would appear, however, that Mr. Briand will not confer with the British premier until after the interpellations of the government in the Chamber of Deputies are completed, and he has secured a vote of confidence.

There are at least nine more members of the Chamber of Deputies to be named relative to reparations, the general financial policy of the ministry and the Silesian question, and it is believed that Mr. Briand will not be able to reply to these and receive a vote of confidence until late tomorrow.

Assurances that they would avoid interference in the Silesian plebiscite area and that shipments of arms and ammunition across the Silesian frontier would be stopped, were given to the Spanish ambassador, General Joseph Wertz, the German chancellor yesterday, served to decrease the tension over the Silesian situation here today.

Announcement is made by the ministry of liberated regions that Germany will soon begin the delivery of wooden houses to be erected in the devastated zone of Northern France. Germany will furnish twenty-five thousand of these houses which will be somewhat similar to the portable houses seen in Canadian summer resort camp colonies, but built more solidly and constructed so that they will be waterproof.

Will Attempt to Recover Vast Sunken Treasure

LONDON, May 25—Another attempt is to be made this summer by the admiralty to recover the remainder of the bullion lost when the armed liner Laurentic was mined and sunk off the north coast of Ireland in 1917.

The salvage vessel, Racer, together with the Canadian drifter No. 1 will undertake the salvage work for the fourth summer. The Laurentic went down in twenty fathoms (120 feet) of water four miles off the coast of Donegal carrying gold bars to the value of between \$10,000,000 and \$15,000,000.

Four years of pounding by Atlantic gales have reduced the wreck to a shapeless mass and each year the work has been more difficult. Last summer the divers found that about 250 tons of hull and deckplates had settled on the strong room, where the gold was stored, breaking it in. The result was that only about \$25,000 was recovered, compared with \$1,250,000 the previous year.

After the winter storms the divers expect to find the wreckage covered with gravel and silt which has to be cleared away with pumps. Then the steel plates and girders must be cut away.

The Racer is now equipped in addition to every possible contrivance for aiding divers, with a "recompression chamber". A diver can reach the bottom in half a minute after prolonged immersion at twenty fathoms below the surface, half an hour has to be allowed for raising him because if
