**PROMOTION.**—Mr. A. J. Macdonald of Montreal, who has been accountant at the Charlotte street branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia, has been promoted to the head office of that institution at Toronto. On Monday evening a number of his friends met and presented him with a gold mounted fountain pen. The recipient was greatly surprised and heartily expressed his thanks for the kind remembrance. Mr. Macdonald is a popular Knight of Columbus, and a large circle of friends, whilst regretting his departure, are pleased to hear of his promotion. He leaves for his new field of labor tonight. **RED CROSS BRANCH.**—In July of 1915 the Ladies of Long River organized a Red Cross Branch and since then have done a considerable amount of work. In September a large box of surgical supplies was shipped to Montreal, and in November a parcel of 56 pairs socks was forwarded to the soldiers. Later a large box of hospital supplies was shipped to Charlottetown containing 2 quilts, 8 pillows, 56 pillow cases, 10 pairs sheets, 3 pair blankets, 19 pair towels, 26 hospital sheets and 35 pyjama suits. When the appeal for socks came from Col. Ings the ladies were all ready and eager to do their share to make up the amount required. Many enjoyable evenings were spent at the different homes, attending Spinning Bees and Knitting Parties, with the result that 83 pairs socks and 22 pairs mitts were made, making a total of 144 pairs socks forwarded since November. Over \$200 has been raised by contributions and suppers. Part of this amount has been spent in sewing materials and the remainder will be forwarded to the Red Cross Secretary.

**HOUSEHOLD SCIENCE SHORT COURSE.**—The second short course in Household Science, conducted by the Women's Institute Branch of the Department of Agriculture, was concluded on Saturday morning. 27 students were enrolled in this course. The classes have been held in Prince of Wales College, and have included the following subjects: Cooking, Preparation of school lunches, home management, sanitation and serving, hygiene, sanitation, prevention and treatment of tuberculosis, home nursing, laundry, millinery and flower making, planning of efficient kitchen, house furnishings, kitchen gardening, improvement of the home grounds, poultry, school improvement, and farm home conveniences. The students gave their undivided attention to their work which was an evidence of the deep interest taken in the course, and they expressed themselves as having received great benefit both from the practical work and the lectures. The third course was enrolled on Monday, January 31st, at 2 p. m., Room 25, Prince of Wales College.

**FAREWELL TO RECRUIT.**—Selkirk has a more enjoyable evening spent than that at the home of Mr. and Mrs. James Graham, Clinton, when a number of young people assembled for the purpose of bidding farewell to their son Lewis, who has enlisted in the 165th Highland Regiment. After some time had been spent in social intercourse and after a few brief remarks were made by Justin Woodside, Bert Mackay, Wilfred Picking and Harold Dunning, Mr. William Warren read the following address and Mr. Harold Woodside presented him with a well filled purse. Dear Lewis:—It is with feelings of pride not unmingled with regret that we, your friends have gathered together to bid you farewell ere you depart from amongst us. We are proud you have enlisted in the service of your King and Country and we congratulate you on your manliness and courage in going forward to fight the enemy. You have enlisted in a great cause that of saving our country from the tyranny and oppression of an unrepentant foe and may God in his kind Providence spare you to return to your native home when the dawn of peace has arrived. In concluding we ask you to accept this purse in token of our appreciation and wish you God speed. 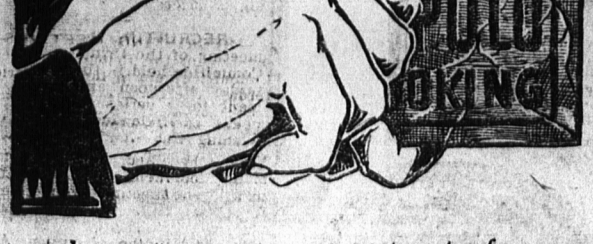
