THE DYING PRESIDENT

Since another article was in type referring to the President's relapse we have received the telegrams elsewhere printed which tell that President McKinley is dying! There is almost a certainty that before these lines are read the end will have come and the brave, good President will have gone to his reward.

The message is the saddest that has been given to the world since our late beloved Queen Victoria was called from earth. It is infinitely sadder in its surroundings than the death of the Queen, who died peacefully at a good old age when her lifework was done. President McKinley was foully struck down while yet in the prime of his career and in the midst of his eminent and useful activity.

The heart of Britain and of Canada has been most deeply touched by the great calamity which has befallen the American people. Again the Anglo-Saxon world is darkened with the pall of mourning and a deep and heartfelt sorrow bridges the ocean and knows no national boundary lines. A prince and a great man has fallen, by a crime which has shocked the civilised world. He has left to his countrymen and to the world a great example. President McKinley lived and he dies nobly, as a Christian, his words when he was suddenly stricken down proving his unselfishness, his care for others, his kindly thought even for his murderer. All that he was must tend to deepen our sorrow for his taking off and deepen our sympathies for the sadly bereaved family and nation.

THE PRESIDENT'S RELAPSE

Not since the first announcement that President McKinley was shot has the public mind throughout America and the world received a severer shock than that of yesterday morning when the announcement was made of his severe and dangerous relapse. The general public had been so strongly assured by a succession of favorable bulletins from the bedside of the distinguished sufferer, that the general conclusion was reached that he was practically out of danger. In that confidence the public rested Thursday night, only to awaken on Friday morning and learn that their hopes had been dashed by an unfavorable change during the night.

The president was shot about 4 o'clock in the afternoon of Friday, 6th September. The first announcement given to the public was that he had but little if any chance of recovery. Within fifteen minutes of the shooting he was removed to the hospital and operated upon. This promptness of the surgeons, together with the fact that the patient bore the operation well, gave the first gleam of reasonable hope. Still many persons had their misgivings. One bullet still remained in his body, said to be embedded in the muscles of the back, near the kidneys, but whether above or below them was not known. The surgeons in charge decided not to make the attempt to remove this bullet unless local inflammation should be set up around it. This conclusion was probably in accord with the best practice, although Prof. Mazzoni of Italy, and some other eminent surgeons expressed the opinion that the bullet ought to be removed.

The favorable progress of the patient during the first five days, his improved temperature, pulse and respiration gave a steadily increasing confidence. During the previous period he had been nourished by enemata. Some liquid food had already been given in the ordinary way, at first in small quantities which were rapidly increased, and our telegrams of the 12th instant showed that solid food was given on that day. To a layman this seemed a remarkable statement—solid food taken into a stomach which less than six days before had been perforated in two sides by a bullet wound. All presumed that the surgeons in attendance knew what they were about, but should a fatal termination ensue there is likely to be much discussion as to the wisdom of their course.

Mr. Walter P. Doull who has been reconstructing the electric plant of the Minto, has gone to Quebec to take charge of the display of lights on board the boat in Honor of the Duke and Duchess of York.

Seven times in the life of the late Queen Victoria attempts were made to kill or assault her. Under British law every one of those attempts was an act of high treason and punishable with death. No one of the assailants was, however, executed. In every case, agreeable to the Queen's desire the criminals were declared to be insane and were sent, as criminal lunatics to madhouses for the term of their natural lives. These historical facts are suggestive of what might be done with the President's assailant if Mr. McKinley lives. Should the President die his assassin will no doubt be sent to the electric chair.

The New York World points out some strange anomalies in the laws of the Empire State. If in New York a man strikes a policeman in uniform he may be imprisoned five years for assault in the second degree. If he strikes a citizen, even though that citizen be the President, he may be imprisoned for only one year, for assault in the third degree. A revenue collector is protected by federal laws with severe penalties against any one who assaults him, but the President is left to the protection of the State laws wherever he may be when assaulted, and then has no better protection than the private citizen. Again, an innocent man, who is only suspected of a crime, may be shot and killed by a policeman if he fails to halt when called upon to do so, but the man who shoots the President with intent to kill, but fails, will escape with his life. There is now a general consensus of opinion in the States that severer penalties must be provided for any assault upon the nation's Chief Magistrate.
