ABERCAVENNY, Wales — (CP) — Richard Davies, 19, who drowned a cat in a milk churn, was told by the magistrates, "We are sorry the law will not allow us to mete out the same punishment to you." Davies was sentenced to serve a month in prison and pay 10 shillings (\$2.25) for making four gallons of milk unfit for human consumption.

Briefs From Britain

LONDON — (CP) — "Victory Bells," cast from metal from German aircraft shot down over Britain, have been placed on sale, with proceeds going to the R.A.F. Benevolent Fund.

DOVER, England — (CP) — This South Coast town, which first became known in 1940 as "Hellfire Corner," now is described by one councillor as "a dump" because of the number of boarded up windows along the main street.

LONDON — (CP) — Committees are being appointed in all blitzed areas to decide whether bombed "pubs" are to be rebuilt on the same spot as before, somewhere else, or not at all.

LONDONDERRY, Northern Ireland — (CP) — Field Marshal Montgomery, accepting the freedom of Londonderry, said his great fear was that disease would sweep through Europe and kill millions of persons.

ABERDEEN, Scotland — (CP) — The Harbor Board has decided to give British vessels priority for berthing at Aberdeen fish market. Foreign vessels will be allowed to berth only after 4 p.m.

LONDON — (CP) — Exchanges of visits between English and German bishops may begin soon as a result of a message from the primate of the Confessional church in Germany asking for restoration of personal communication between the churches.

SHEFFIELD — (CP) — Hot rum today was the order of the day when a vat containing 800 gallons of rum caught fire. The blaze was extinguished before much damage was done—to the firemen or the rum.

LONDON — (CP) — Field Marshal Montgomery, new colonial commandant of the Royal Tank Regiment, revealed the secret of his famous bere in a message to the regiment. He said it was given him by a sergeant commanding his tank during the Battle of Alamein.

LONDONDERRY, Northern Ireland — (CP) — Londonderry naval base, one of the headquarters of the war against the U-boat, is to become an anti-submarine school.

LONDON — (CP) — of 140,000 army vehicles now parked in various parts of Britain, only 25,000 could be used commercially in their present condition, it is announced. Many have high gasoline consumption and maintenance costs out of proportion to the payloads they carry.

The Nationalist announcement followed disturbances at Johannesburg when they organized a "victory" parade through the city and clashed outside the city hall with a huge crowd of soldiers and civilians. Police were forced to use batons to protect delegates to the Nationalist congress being held in the city hall.

The Nationalists said the combat teams would be recruited from youths in the party and would be used only against "Communist rabble." A deputation of party leaders called on Premier Smuts demanding an inquiry into the disturbances.

Dr. Steyn said it would be the height of folly to tolerate Nazi or other activities which would ultimately bring ruin on South Africa as they had on Germany. Steps would be taken to deal with many attempts to create such an organization.

An air service between the Union and Britain will start about the middle of November, Claude Sturrock, minister of transport, announced at a meeting of the South African air transport council. One York aircraft will operate each way.

Mr. Sturrock told the council civil aviation in this part of the world could not achieve its full promise until all nations in South Africa were brought into the picture fully. rock told the council, no commitments had yet been made although the Union had not been a short local production of 4,500,000 bags, Dr. C. H. Neveling, secretary of agriculture, announced. He promised Africans their supplies would not be cut further but if necessary quotas set for stock and poultry would be cut further. A comprehensive scheme of supplying food to the drought-stricken native areas is now being undertaken. Mobile and central markets are being set up.

All production of war equipment in South Africa has ceased, according to a government announcement. The ordnance factory at Johannesburg is closing down next month after having turned out 5,700 armored cars and other war equipment, including three floating docks, 100 barges, and 900 aircraft hangars.

BEDS REPLACE AIRCRAFT

LONDON — (CP) — Two thousand camp beds replaced fighter and torpedo bomber aircraft in the hangars of the aircraft carrier Intrepid when she left Australia to help repatriate Far East prisoners of war.

JAP PRISON CAMP

These remarkable pen and ink drawings of the North Point Jap prison camp at Hong Kong were sketched by Sgt. J. Payne and given to H/Capt. Uriah Laité, beloved chaplain of the Winnipeg Grenadiers. Sgt. Payne is now missing and believed to have been executed by the Japs following an attempted escape in August 1942. The cooking and eating utensils show the ingenuity of Canadians in trying to improve living conditions under their imprisonment. (Note the herring tin used as a sauce pan).—(Canadian Army Photo)
