In Memoriam

MRS. LORIN BREHAUT

On November 22nd a choice spirit passed away suddenly at her home in Georgetown Royalty in the person of Mrs. Lorin Brehaut. Mrs. Brehaut (nee Besse Serena Le Lacheur) graduated from the Massachusetts General Hospital in September, 1906, and for some time was engaged in Children's Welfare Work in New York. On February 14th, 1920, she married Mr. Lorin Brehaut who predeceased her some years ago.

At the funeral services which were held on November 24th, and were conducted by her minister, the Rev. Sidney J. Boyle, B. A. of St. David's United Church, Georgetown, a large number of relatives and friends gathered to pay loving tribute to a lady of exceptional personality. Words of sincere eulogy were spoken with the dictum of the Psalmist: "The memory of the righteous is just," as text. Her beautiful garden, her generosity to the Church and other worthy causes, her mental alertness, her good deeds and her courage in the face of growing physical handicaps, will be cherished memories with many. The hymns "Rock of Ages" and "Abide with Me" were feelingly sung. Many beautiful flowers bore silent but eloquent expression to the deep affection in which Mrs. Brehaut was held. After the service a long funeral procession made its way to the Murray Harbour Cemetery where interment was made by the side of her husband.
